MAYORS MESSAGE

Obviously with the effects of the COVID virus we are still suffering lots of disruptions and discomfort and of course confusion and concerns. For us at Council, our projects are proceeding at an acceptable rate both through contractors and our own staff. As part of these projects, we have received lots of interest in our front entrance designs. Consultation has now closed, and the community has spoken with Option D being a clear favourite with 79% community support from the 126 community responses received. At the February Ordinary meeting Council approved this final design to proceed to construction with the aim of completing the works mid to late 2022. The paving in Hawker is also nearing completion, so we will see Stage 2 of our Streetscape paving commencing in Quorn in the near future.

Council has a ten-year plan to improve the footpaths in our communities and evidence of this can be seen in Ellis St., Joyce St. and Pool St., Quorn. Works are also planned in Hawker later this year with works being prioritised upon need and another significant funding allocation having been secured for next financial year for further works. However, the ongoing works are a large impost on Council on top of our weed/ant spraying and vegetation pick up. Traditionally the care and maintenance of the road verge is the responsibility of homeowners, but we recognise the fact that this can be difficult for a lot of our more elderly residents, so we assist with this responsibility. Having said that, as always, please take pride in our town by assisting with raking and spraying your footpath if you are able to.

The next consultation and survey that you will see will be for the "Quorn Town Square" that refers to the area behind the Council Chambers. We want to turn this into a special place not only for visitors but also for our residents so please have your say. Later in the year we will be asking Hawker residents for their input into the revamping of Blue Burt Park. On a final note and on behalf of the Council I say thank you to the Hawker Swimming Pool Committee who handed over a cheque for \$5,537 at the Hawker Community Development Board meeting to help replace the damaged shade area at the Hawker Swimming Pool.

BIN COLLECTION AND SAFETY FOR DRIVERS

If you're parking in a street, be aware of waste collection days and park away from bins.

2022 will see the 40th Pichi Richi Marathon taking place from Port Augusta to Quorn through the majestic Pichi Richi pass. To celebrate this achievement a dedicated group of event supporters and participants have worked hard to secure Stephen (Steve) Moneghetti, AM to be an event day ambassador.

Steve was nominated for an Order of Australia medal in 2014 for significant service to athletics as a marathon runner, administrator and mentor to young athletes, and was inducted

into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame in 2021.



The 40th anniversary event is expected to attract over 500 competitors. "The organisers are working hard behind the scenes to ensure this event truly celebrates the anniversary occasion."

MAJOR FUNDING AWARDED FOR MULTIPLE PROJECTS

GRANT FUNDING APPROVED FOR ROAD & INFRASTRUCTURE UPGRADES

The Flinders Ranges Council is very pleased to announce the approval of grant funding, which will enable multiple projects across the council area.

Funding in the amount of \$772,714 was awarded to Council by the Commonwealth Government, through Phase 3 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program.

Mayor, Greg Flint says "This major funding boost will enable Council to complete several projects which would otherwise have had to be implemented over time and within our budget limitations. We will now be able to proceed with much needed upgrades and improvements to some of our important community facilities, including the public toilets in Quorn and Hawker, the Community Walking Trail and the playground fencing at Blue Burt Park in Hawker, and many sections of roads and footpaths.

The Member for Grey, Rowan Ramsey, congratulated The Flinders Ranges Council for electing to spend about 50% of their allocation on sheeting/re-sheeting a string of local roads and the balance on a wide range of community infrastructure including toilet blocks, bicycle paths and footpaths in Hawker and Quorn.

"There are constant calls on Councils to allocate resources for any number of projects across their geographical area," Mr Ramsey said. "Securing extra funding for very necessary but lower profile programs like road repairs and footpaths will make an enormous difference."

"The LRCI grants demonstrate the confidence the Federal Government has in Local Government and acknowledges the importance of rural and regional communities," Mr Ramsey said.

"In three rounds the LRCI program has now delivered \$2.5bn for vital road and community infrastructure upgrades," he said. "It comes at a time where there has been unprecedented investment in regional roads through programs like the Building Better Regions Fund, The Drought Communities Program and Mobile Black Spots".
