MAYORAL REPORT

The month since the January Ordinary Council meeting has been a busy and productive month with progress being made on several important fronts, including lobbying for water quality in Quorn, the Northern Passenger Transport Network, significant works at the Quorn and Hawker Aerodromes being awarded, along with the Quorn Town Square Works and the Blue Burt Park Works progressing well. The month has also had some extremely positive news with the Quorn Silo Light Show winning a national gold award at the Australian Street Art Awards, which builds on the earlier silver medal.

In respect of water quality issues in Quorn, the CEO and I travelled to Adelaide on 6 February 2023 to meet with the Chief Executive Officer of the Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA), Adam Wilson to discuss the draft Regional Water Quality Aesthetics Improvement Plan released by SA Water. This plan identifies Quorn at the top of the list on every metric and therefore the priority for water quality improvements (i.e. a pipeline or a desalination plant).

The CEO and myself also attended a meeting with the Honourable Minister Susan Close, the responsible minister for SA Water on Tuesday 21 February 2023 along with Eddie Hughes MP and put forward our case strongly. This was a successful meeting that gave us a chance to highlight the importance of the issue in our community.

A further meeting is also being arranged alongside our colleagues in the District Council of Mount Remarkable, to meet with the Hon. Minister Geoff Brock to seek his support in lobbying for water quality, noting that Melrose also has significant water quality issues.

In respect of the Northern Passenger Transport Network, our incredibly important patient transport service, the CEO and I met with the Flinders Alliance (an alliance of six neighbouring Councils) on 9 February 2023 to further pursue the potential of the service being run with The Flinders Ranges Council as the head contractor. The aim of this being to ensure that we can secure this essential service for our communities for many years to come. Significant negotiation is currently occurring in this space, and I am hoping to provide an update on our progress in coming months. However, rest assured this is a key priority.

In respect of the Quorn and Hawker Aerodromes, the sealing and civil works have now been awarded with contracts being finalised. The works are significant and are primarily grant funded and will result in the resealing of the Hawker strip and sealing of the Quorn Aerodrome including civil works. The works have commenced temporary closures for both aerodromes will be communicated. The expected completion date for these works is mid-2023.

The Blue Burt Park and Quorn Precinct works are travelling well with the intention of finalising the works before the tourist season kicks off. Official openings are planned, with details for the Quorn Precinct in this newsletter and we will advise the community of the details for Bue Burt Park when they are set. Further, the upgrade of the Quorn and Hawker Public toilets and the soon to commence entrance way in Quorn are also keenly anticipated.

Finally, I take this opportunity to congratulate, once again formally, all of our Australia Day award winners. accept our thanks appreciation for the work you do in our communities. I also take this opportunity to thank everyone involved in making the Quorn Silo Light Show a success in particular her Cindi Drennan team. Ken Anderson, Mayor

"We will take everything that makes the Fringe and Festival such a magical month and transport that feeling from Adelaide to the Flinders Ranges for a weekend of great fun, dizzying stunts and fantastic music

Bamboozled has been engaged by The Flinders Ranges Council to bring this exciting event to the region. Mayor, Ken Anderson is looking forward to utilising the new precinct and bringing the festival to town.

"This will be the first event to utilise the new Performing and Visual Arts Precinct in Quorn and will take full advantage of the amazing festival space including the stage, paved and grassed areas," Mayor Anderson says.

"It's very exciting as a small Council to be able to host this event and make it accessible for those that are unable to make it to Adelaide as they still get to experience the event and world class acts," Mayor Anderson says.

Bamboozled will be bringing their boutique 90-seat circus tent, The Little Palais, to Fringe in the Flinders to house short circus shows from 5pm-10pm on Saturday 18 March, while outdoor stages will host music, comedy, circus and acrobatic performances.

OUTDOOR DINING PLATFORMS ROLLING OUT

Supported by the SA Government 2020-21 Open Space Grant Program and the Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program, the outdoor dining platforms project has started rolling out.

When considering this initiative Council was aware of the issues with the narrow footpaths and the need to maintain the heritage of the streets when it comes to filming opportunities.

Therefore, these visually appealing and accessible outdoor dining platforms were developed, so that they can be easily removed for filming of movies, television shows etc. The platforms support the eateries by increasing their seating capacity and enhancing their appeal to diners.

Flinders Food Co has embraced the concept and are the first business to have them installed. Other businesses have expressed their interest and will soon be sporting their own alfresco dining platforms. The platforms are leased from Council by way of a signed agreement and yearly fee.

The platforms were locally designed, manufactured and installed.
