Projects Update



Quorn Bush Tucker Trail Stage 2

Stage 2 of the Pithi Kawi Quorn Bush Tucker Trail is being completed with the installation of new seating near the oval. Exercise equipment is also in the process of being installed near the back of the oval with works on the platform and surrounds to be undertaken.

This project was funded through the State Government—Open Space Grant Program.

Friends Reacquaint after 50 years

SATURDAY OCTOBER 22 WAS an eagerly awaited day for two 99-year-old school friends who met up again after almost 50 years.

Although the ladies only live four hours apart, they hadn't seen each other in all those years. Both 'girls' had kept in touch most Christmases and were very excited about the reunion. This was arranged by one of Mary's daughters at *Teas on the Terrace* which unbeknown to her was a former residence of Shirley's, which made it even more special.

Shirley Hughes (nee Williams) was born April 14th 1923 and Mary Norris (nee Warnock) was born the same year on July 16. Both were educated in Quorn. Mary completed her primary education at the local Catholic school, and Shirley at the primary school. The two of them then attended the high school.

After high school Mary went to Adelaide to train as a domestic arts teacher whilst Shirley was employed locally. Mary returned to Quorn and taught at the high school. She met, and later married Keith Norris, who was working as a carpenter. They moved to Adelaide where they built their home in Lower Mitcham and lived there until Keith passed away at 54. They had, three children, Keith Elizabeth and Anne.

Shirley is a long-time resident of Quorn. She married John Hughes, a mechanic from the local garage. They had three children, Sandra, John and David. John senior died, aged 71.

Mary is the daughter of Samuel and Delia Warnock. Sam worked for the railways. He was the station master at Quorn during the war years, 1939-45, and later transferred to Port Augusta.



Mary had four siblings, Sheila, Margaret, Betty and Tom. Sheila married Keith Gloede, the local barber, and had five children. Margaret married James O'Brien, a local lad, who died from tetanus at a very early age, 36 years. They had five children, including twins. Betty entered the convent and spent many years working in Papua New Guinea. Thomas married Desma Paskalis. They had three children.

Shirley is the daughter of Maurice and Isabella Williams. Maurice was a blacksmith at the local railway sheds.

Whilst in Quorn Mary and her family met up with Greg George and his wife Dianne. They also learnt that Bob and Hazel West have returned to live in Quorn. Mary would have enjoyed travelling on the Pichi Richi train from Quorn to Port Augusta but mobility issues prevented her from doing so.

During the weekend Mary also travelled to Hawker where in her youth she spent many happy times visiting her relatives, the Ganley family, who lived there.

Both Shirley and Mary regret the passing of Queen Elizabeth II with their pending 100th birthdays in 2023. (They are not excited about receiving a letter for the occasion from King Charles III).

The two of them credit their long life to not smoking nor drinking alcohol, plenty of clean country air and of course, playing sport.

Oh, Where to Find a Seat?

THE ARTICLE, 'Where Can I Find a Seat?' in last month's *Mercury* sure got noticed! The Monday after that issue came out, I was spoken to five times about it on my walk. One woman told me her husband would love to go out walking, but is not very well, so it's too risky without seats to sit on at regular intervals.

Another said something like, 'Millions of bucks for a Food Walk, and not even a few hundred thousand for seats!'

A third: 'Tourists come first, Locals a looong way second, and Old Folk even worse than last.'

A few other people have said they'd write to Council but one of them added, 'Ah, what's the use! No one listens to any sensible ideas!'

Seats on Hike Routes

THERE ARE REGULAR hikers/bushwalkers who are used to walking long hike trails. But the average non-hikers almost always ask me, 'How long is it?' And if it's more than 5 km return, they don't want to do it. 5 km is their limit.

So we're putting seats about 2.5 km up our longer hike routes to attract the 5 km walkers. The Dutchman's Stern is a 10.6 km circuit, or 8.4 km return up to the top. Too far for most. Therefore we're putting a seat at Terrace Lookout, 2.5 km up the Terrace Trail, soon. And we already have one 3 km up the Valley Trail.

On Mt Brown we already have one 2.7 km up the Western Trail at Bald Hill Lookout. We intend putting one 2.5 km up the Eastern Trail at Richman Valley Lookout. Otherwise, the Mt Brown Trail is all of 15 km return—much too far.

They're designed to attract non-hikers to walk.

Even More Attractive Still

HOW OFTEN I ARRIVE at the car parks at the start of Hiking Trails, and see old men and/or old women sitting in cars. So I ask them why. And they say their younger families are walking the Trail, but it's too far for them. And sadly, even those 2.5 km seats are too far away too.

So now we're starting to erect seats only a few hundred metres up our Trails to attract Grandpa and Grandma to shuffle along that far, instead of vegetating in their family's cars! Eg, there's the Horseshoe Pound Lookout seat planned 600 metres up the Dutchman's Stern Trail.

Aaaaand the Point Is?

WELL, THE POINT is, if a mere handful of people interested in attracting locals *and* tourists to walk even only a little way up our Trails by providing seats aimed just at them, why can't Quorn provide seats *regularly placed around our town* to attract locals and tourists to walk all over it too?

Apart from helping old people and invalids to actually get outside their homes and walk a bit, and even get healthier and live longer, it'd show people from other country towns that *here's* a town that takes care of *every one of its citizens!* Aren't those truly worthwhile aims—and probably not all very expensive aims either?

Wilmington has the right idea. A beautiful 1·1 km trail from their Golf Course gate to the top of Mt Maria (490 metres high) provides you with a spectacular view over the town to the distant horizon, as you can see in the photo above.


But best of all, when you arrive at the low summit, after only just a 1·1 km walk—Wow! There's a *seat* for your weary, weary bones.

Lament for our Aussie Lingo

THIS IS NOT AN attack on the sign itself but is merely prompted by its words. It's opposite our Swimming Pool, and says 'Bush Food Walk'.

The Cambridge Encyclopedia of The English Language says there are 83 versions of our English Language in the world. The main ones are British English (the original version, of course), American English, and our own Aussie English. The rest are English as spoken in other countries as their second language.



Some have special names such as 'Japlish' for Japanese English, 'Singlish' for Singaporean English, etc. But altogether they're examples of English as those countries' second language. They show that English is becoming the world's most-used language. Rosemary Salomone's 2022 book, *The Rise of English*, is about this.

I read how a German Engineer was invited to China to help set up a factory. But he couldn't speak Chinese, and the Chinese Engineer couldn't speak German. No matter. They communicated in English. Problem solved.

Aussie English used to be famed around the world, admired everywhere. *The Penguin Book of Australian Slang: A Dinkum Guide to Oz English* has around 20,000 Aussie words such as that 'Lingo' in my title. And there are plenty of other books about our lingo, too, such as the *Macquarie Australian Slang Dictionary*, and

John O'Grady's famous Aussie English: An Explanation of the Australian Idiom.

Sadly, though, there are two attacks on Aussie Lingo that are destroying it rapidly. One is the dominance of American English due to their TV programmes, films, and internet dominance. The other is that too many Aussies are quite happy to give in to American English.

It's almost as if us Aussies are being coerced into abandoning our own unique language, and are now afraid to even use it any more.

'Bush Food Walk'? Well, 'Bush' is Aussie Lingo, since its meaning elsewhere is a 'Shrub'. Yet in Oz it means 'the country as opposed to the city'. But 'Food'? Well, the Aussie word for that is 'Tucker'! How sad that that great Aussie word was *not* used! Are we now ashamed of it?

Under 'Tucker' John O'Grady gives us this:
Food. There's 'good tucker', 'beaut tucker', 'bad
tucker', 'lousy tucker', 'plenty tucker', 'lashin's of
tucker, and 'not enough bloody tucker'. When there is
enough tucker, you 'tuck in', or 'get stuck into it'. [Etc]
So why be ashamed to use our own Aussie word?

Our Great Poet, C.J. Dennis

LEFT IS THE COVER of a book of his famous poems—world-famous once upon a time. He's known as our great 'Larrikin Poet' (1876–1933). Plays, and films were made of his poems, not just in Oz, but even in countries like the USA! He made more money from just his poems than any other Aussie poet ever has.

The Aussie National Anthem

WE DIDN'T HAVE our own national anthem until a few decades ago. Officially we sang that idiotic English one which *excludes* from God's help everyone except the King/Queen! Well...semi-unofficially we sang 'Banjo' Paterson's 'Waltzing Matilda', even at the Olympic Games.

I always thought how much us singing about a Swaggie who stole a jumbuck (sheep) made a farce of *all* national anthems. How great!

Of course, I *think* when we held a referendum for an anthem we had three choices: 'God Save the Queen', or 'Waltzing Matilda', or the silly one about Gertie on the Beach. We chose 'Waltzing Matilda', of course, but our Government ignored that and chose 'Gertie' instead.

But way back in 1908 we held a competition for an Anthem, and C. J. Dennis entered his famous one as a joke. Here's its start:

The Austra—laise

Fellers of Australier,
Blokes an' coves an' coots,
Shift yer—carcases,
Move yer—boots.
Gird yer—loins up,
Get yer—gun,
Set the—enemy

An' watch the—run.


CHORUS

Get a—move on,

Have some—sense.

Learn the—art of

Self de——fence.

You insert the appropriate swear words where all the dashes are. There are more stanzas too. It's sung to the tune, 'Onward Christian Soldiers'.

Though a joke, it was awarded a *Special* Prize. And in 1915 in the First World War, it was printed for our Soldiers to sing when marching! They were the days when Aussies really did have a great sense of humour.

A Sentimental Bloke



Hal Gye drew 'The Bloke' and Doreen as nymphets
BUT DENNIS'S greatest achievement was his
Melbourne street larrikin, 'The Bloke', who
despite his street smarts falls in love with
Doreen. 'The Songs of a Sentimental Bloke' are
a brilliant series of poems in our Aussie Lingo:

The Intro

'Er name's Doreen . . . Well, spare me bloomin' days! You could 'a' knocked me down wiv 'arf a brick! Yes, me, that kids meself I know their ways, An' 'as a name for smoogin' in our click! I jist lines up an' tips the saucy wink.

But strike! The way she piled on dawg! Yer'd think A bloke was givin' back chat to the Queen . . . 'Er name's Doreen.

I seen 'er in the markit first uv all,
Inspectin' brums at Steeny Isaac's stall.

I backs me barrer in—the same ole way—An' sez, "Wot O! It's been a bonzer day.
'Ow is it fer a walk?"...Oh, 'oly wars!
The sorter look she gimme! Jest becors
I tried to chat 'er, like you'd make a start
Wiv any tart.

An' I kin take me oaf I wus perlite,
An' never said no word that wasn't right,
An' never tried to maul 'er, or to do
A thing yeh might call crook. Ter tell yeh true,
I didn't seem to 'ave the nerve—wiv 'er.
I felt as if I couldn't go that fur,
An' start to sling off chiack like I used.

Not intra juiced! Etc

Many of our Soldiers in the First World War carried Dennis's poems in their kit. Maybe we've got too serious for such things today? ■

Tales from the Willochra School in the 1940's

The Willochra School was on the Hawker road just north of the bridge crossing the Willochra Creek. The earliest memories of the school that I can remember is of nearly getting to the school and seeing my new teacher. I said to my sister "She is not going to teach me." So I took off and my sister, Joan, ran me down and dragged me back to school. To this day I don't know why this happened because they were both ladies.


Rhodder Parker, the one that left, had dark hair (*She married Keith French*) and Gloria Matthews had red hair, which is the only difference that I can remember. That should not have worried me because my sister had red hair. They both left before I can remember what they were really like.

Then Cecil Hastwell, the school teacher came and taught for the rest of my school days. I remember quite often he would be late for school and because of this very often we would go home. The school was about one and a half kilometres (about 1 mile) from where we all lived, at the time, in the Willochra cottages.

A couple of times we saw "Hassie" (that's what we all called him) when he couldn't see us as he was going to school, but we never went back. He use to like using the cane and I got my fair share. However, one boy used to keep pulling his hand back and that would make him quite wild. The boy was possibly either Kelvin Carman or Peter McKay, but I cannot remember which one. You could see his face getting redder and redder all the time, so he got the bright idea to make us bend over and touch our toes and give it across the backside with as much force as he could muster.

Another time he sent a boy (and not me) out to the lunch room to wait for his punishment, but when he went out the boy was gone. The whole school was searching for him. He was eventually found well outside the school yard, hiding behind a bush.

We could pick the locks on the school door, so one day I did just that and got the cane and put it through a hole in the floor. The school had a board floor and a knot had come out leaving a hole in the floor. That was the end of the cane!!!

One day when "Hassie" was quite late, the school inspector came. He had arrived at the Willochra siding by train and had walked to the school. When he got there he said to us kids "Where is the school teacher?". We answered that "He was not here yet". He then asked "How often does this happen?" and our answer was "This happens all the time". When Mr. Hastwell did get to school, we could hear raised voices. This went on for a fair while and so school never started that day until after lunch and "Hassies" face was still as red as anything. I think that was the quietest that the school had ever been while I was there.

One day a chap came through pushing a wheelbarrow and said that he was pushing it from Darwin to Port Augusta for a bet. Evidently he dipped the barrow into the sea at Darwin and was going to do the same in Port Augusta. To this day I don't know whether that is right or just a story he spun us. Imagine pushing a steel wheelbarrow that far on an unmade dirt road.

Some time in February 1946 we had quite a big rain. It was not long after Christmas and the flood went right through the school and ruined all the books left in the desks, so the school was quarantined for six weeks, giving us a 14 week Christmas holiday, which was great for me because I hated school.

I did not finish up very big, but what I did not like was that even the girls at school were taller than me. So when we lined up to march inside I was always on the end. I used to say that I was the south end of a north bound cow.

The story of a man pushing a wheelbarrow is true and on Thursday 15th of August 1946 the following article appeared in the original Quorn Mercury.

PUSHING WHEEL BARROW FROM DARWIN

Port Augusta Believed to be End of Long Journey

HENRY Cook, whose flowing beard and long hair makes his age indeterminable, has passed through the township of Copley in what garded as the world's longest wheelbarrow push-Darwin to Port Augusta, nearly 2,000 miles.

Cook set out in February. He will at the roadside each night. not tell the reason for his trek, but seems happy about it and says that he has never been more fit in his life.

One rumour is that Cook, in arguing how far a man could push a barrow, said he could push one across the continent. Someone bet him £300 that he could not, so he promptly got a barrow and set out. He is now only a few hundred miles from his goal in a little over six months. Christmas was said to be the time limit for the bet.

Cooks barrow contains a small swag, a waterbag and a spare pair of boots. He sleeps alongside the barrow | foot.

He has averaged about 10 miles a day and if he maintains that average he should arrive in Adelaide some time next month.

However, it is believed that wager, if he is doing the journey for a wager-will be won when he reaches Port Augusta, as he will then have crossed the continent from seaboard to seaboard.

Cook told spectators at Copley that he had been offered several rides, but had relused them, as he was determined to do the whole journey on

AN UNUSUAL PHOTO of the combined Quorn, Wilmington, and Pt Augusta Tennis Clubs in Pt Augusta on 10th May, 1901. Major Wingfield invented modern tennis in England in 1873 (officially called 'Lawn Tennis', but played on hard courts too). Social tennis was very popular in our region at that time, and women played it in long, bulky dresses. Quorn used to have an extraordinary number of tennis courts in the mid-20th century.


2022 Premiers—Under 11 Division 3






