
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Citizen Of the Year Awards 2022 Community Members Recognised for Contributions

Chat with a Quornie Ann Arancelovic



I'M OFTEN ASKED where I came from. My answer is 'Nowhere, but everywhere.'

I'll start with my parents. Mum and Dad (Connie and Norm Shone) grew up a few streets from each other in Hindmarsh, Adelaide. They didn't know each other then.

Dad was the youngest of 10 children. He was a returned serviceman and a cooper by trade. Mum was the youngest of three, and a tailoress by trade.

They met and married after WW11, and moved to Cherry Gardens, where my sisters, Arlene and Maureen were born.

Mum and Dad had a milk round. Some funny stories came out of their time there, like a snake in the thunderbox, and a cow lying down on Dad, when he was trying to milk her.

They were caught up in 'Black Sunday' bushfires, where a couple of local people were killed. Mum said the fire was heading up hill toward their place, when the wind changed direction. Lucky, I guess.

Moving around

MUM AND DAD MOVED from Cherry Gardens to Gawler, where I was born in 1954. We shifted to Broken Hill, then back to Gawler, where Tony was born.

When I was three or four, we moved to the new satellite city of Elizabeth, where. I remember all the kids in the street playing from daylight 'til dark. My sister, Maureen, was marbles champion of our street, and the boys used to get shitty. She had the most and best marbles, as we played 'winner take all'.

Our next move was to Port Pirie, when Dad joined the Northern Region of E&WS. My memories of our Pirie days were of a lot of fun. Again, another street full of kids.

Cathryn was born there, but eighteen months

On the way to school we were teased with 'Catholic dogs stink like frogs, in and out the teacher's gobs'. Despite this. I remember life being fun, even when we found out that our house was

haunted.

Crystal Book was where I became aware that being different religions **meant** something to some people. I've never understood that.

There was an orphanage attached to the school and church. This started my interest in aboriginal culture, and my wish to help kids without a family life like ours.

I thought we were rich, and didn't find out until I was older that most people in those times just struggled along financially. To me, being rich meant having a close family.

Southern Yorke Peninsula

WE MOVED DOWN to live in Yorketown for six years. I don't know why we went there, as Dad only came home once a month. It was a horrible time for us, particularly Mum.

I finished primary school and went to high school, but hated it.

Michael and Francesca were born there. Maureen married, and had my nephew Sean. Arlene went nursing in Adelaide. It was when a man walked on the moon.

We got to know Colleen and Jeff Brown (a former Postmaster at Quorn) when they, and their three little boys, sat in front of us at church. I think Tony and I used to pull faces at them, and got in trouble (we felt the reminder of Mum's very long fingernails).

Dad spent some time working at Mt Gunson, putting in a pipeline for the mine, which didn't start until years later.

One of my funniest memories was of one trip to Adelaide. Dad would never stop, so Mum, in her wisdom, took a potty with us.

Frankie was just toilet trained and when she finished her pee, Mum threw it out the front window. The back one was open and subsequently we were all splattered. I don't think we laughed at the time, but it *was* funny looking back.

My first job

JUST AFTER MY 16th birthday, we moved to Mannum. I was in my last year of school and Michael had just started. We lived in a great old house overlooking the river. It was a wonderful time for our family.

The next year, I was accepted into nursing at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Woodville.

Mum and Dad shifted to Quorn in 1971. Tony, Cathy and Mick went to Quorn Area school, and Frankie to the kindy.

Dad worked with Tommy Wills, Malcolm Eckert, Clarrie Hillman and Brenton Schnell at Quorn E &WS. He loved the Flinders, and liked nothing more than getting in his ute and driving out checking everything.

Dad was a true conservationist, and could see the problems we're facing today, way back then. He wasn't afraid to argue the point with 'the powers that be' about water conservation.

In 1978, Mum and Dad moved to Pt Augusta. Dad was Superintendent for the Northern Region, until he retired in 1988.

Sadly, he died in February 1990, missing the births of three grandchildren—Cathy's Jon, Frankie's Hannah, and our baby Tom—born within a week of one another in June that year.

Mum was a tailoress, so certainly knew how to sew. There weren't too many brides who hadn't had a wedding dress made by Connie in the seven years they lived here. God knows how many she made, including all of ours.

Sandy and me

I MET SANDY, who lived in Stirling North, in 1974. He worked at ETSA, where he'd done his trade as a fitter and turner.

In June I started work at Quorn Hospital. Lois Hughes was Matron then, and it was a busy little place—much different from city hospitals. It was hard work, but a lot of fun.

I worked with a lot of great nurses. Carlene Voigt was Director of Nursing for most of the years I was at the hospital. I have fond memories of Greta Buhlmann, Bev Pratt, Lee Reid, Marg Coad, Jenny Pearce, Cheryl Finlay, Johnnie Fielding, Carol Seligar, Jenny Laidlaw, Beryl Woodman, Glenys Fielding, Mrs Gladys Pumpa and dozens more.

In April, 1976, we married and moved to Port Hedland for two years. Sandy was employed by for BHPs Mount Newman Mining and I worked at Port Hedland hospital.

The town was relatively new and it was obviously a much smaller port than it is today.

Back to Quorn

JUST BEFORE Bianca was born, we moved back to Quorn to a house on Altmann Rd we'd bought from Joy and Des Finlay. We had a great time doing it up.

Unfortunately our time in the house was tinted with a degree of sadness, as Sandy was diagnosed with testicular cancer (at 25 years of age), which mean our chances of having more kids was about zilch.

After a few years, we decided to adopt from overseas. After a few conversations with Dr Devindah Grewal, we chose Sri Lanka, .

We waited two and a half years, until November 1986 when we flew to Sri Lanka to pick up our son, Kaleb. It was a very special time for us, but unfortunately again tainted with difficulty, as we contracted Hep A and were most unwell.

I was also pregnant, which was pretty cool for a while. Sophie was born in June, but sadly, died four days later.

Later in the year, we went to

Adelaide, where Sandy had been accepted into nursing at Royal Adelaide Hospital. For our family of four, we bought a small house in Crafers.

Sandy moved on to Children's Hospital, to nurse children with cancer. I worked at Julia Farr Centre; and the fun began.

A few weeks after we moved, I found out I was pregnant with Tom. His birth was followed, two years later, by Gabrielle, then Josh. Life was a circus, but so much fun

Six years later, we went back to Port Hedland. A the end of the nineties, it was five times bigger than Quorn. This time Sandy worked at the hospital as a manager.

Return to SA

We stayed there for two years, and returned to SA to live in Tumby Bay. Sandy was Nurse Manager at Tumby Bay Hospital. We lived there for the next 15 years.

All the kids finished their schooling, and have fond memories of Tumby, especially of the beach, only 200m from our home.

While we were there, Sandy was talked into starting up a judo club. One lad, Jake Andrewartha, went on to represent Australia at the London Olympics, and won a Commonwealth Games Bronze Medal.

As for our kids, Bianca was at University at 16, studying Opera. (But she still says she can't sing). She's married with two boys, Angus, 12 and Flynn, who is nine. She's a Beauty Therapist, and hopes to move to Quorn later in the year.

Kaleb lives and works at Powercell Batteries in Adelaide. He was a very good sportsman, who excelled at footy, cricket and athletics in his school years. He is currently a pretty good golfer, and has taken many beautiful family photographs of our family.

Thomas is married with two kids—Lenny, aged four and Eadie—20 months. He lives in Pt Augusta, and has recently taken an apprenticeship. Like Sandy, he was very good at judo, representing SA in many national competitions.

Gabrielle is a Registered Nurse, now on maternity leave from Adelaide Children's Hospital. She and her husband and little three month old, Percy live at Bridgewater.

Josh, our youngest, works at Roxby in the mines, after five years working at the Rec Centre, mainly at the aquatic school.

Anderson Dancers

Mum was principal seamstress for Anderson Dancers, Pt Augusta, for 40 years. She devoted many hours sewing for the *Pantos* (Pantomines), until she turned ninety. She had a great friendship with Ethel Anderson, who passed away recently, aged 94.

The skill must have rubbed off. Our son, Tom, makes costumes and uses one of Mum's sewing machines. We've all dabbled in the arts—some more successfully than others.

Michael, has his own engineering company—*Alchemy*. He has worked for Adelaide Festival Theatre on productions. He created effects for Disney Australia's *Aladdin*, for *King Kong*, *Phantom of the Opera* and the mechanical effects of *Billy Elliot* all over the world. But for Covid, he'd have been in Wuhan working on the *Phantom*. Now.

My other brother Tony, lives in Sydney. He has a background as a carpenter, and built sets for Fashion Week, *Gladiator*; Opera in the Harbour, and many TV and theatre shows.

I have great respect for what Ethel, Lindy, and Mum achieved. They give kids a chance to perform, and wear pretty cool costumes. I wish them success into a third generation.

From their seven kids, Mum and Dad have 19 grandchildren and 22 great grandchildren.

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Quorn Community Landcare Group wins state award

THE 'LANDSCAPE SA Excellence Award' was presented to the Quorn Community Landcare Group late 2021, by SAAL Landscape board member Mrs Sanchia Treloar on behalf of the Minister for Environment and Water, the hon. David Speirs.

The highly contested award was based on the Reviving Biodiversity in the Ranges project run by the Quorn Community Landcare Group which involves a series of initiatives by community volunteers in delivering biodiversity outcomes in the Flinders Ranges.

Through a broad-based partnership it has established and maintained cochineal breeding nurseries, delivered soil erosion control projects on local farms, run a series of propagation workshops, supported revegetation of Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby habitat at Warren Gorge and supported the collection of seed and plants for the Quorn Bush Food Garden.



The group has most recently been involved in establishing a native perennial grass seedbank in the Quorn parklands with the Flinders Ranges Council. Receiving the award on behalf of the Quorn Community Landcare Group were President Tim Connell and Secretary Andrea Tschirner. \$5,000 was a part of the award which will be invested back into the work of the Quorn Community Landcare Group. ■

Quorn Pioneer Machinery Society



THE QUORN PIONEER MACHINERY SOCIETY Inc [QPMS] would like to take this opportunity to update the community on the progress of its activities and provide information on the progress of the building infrastructure etc, that is taking place in the Lions Park in Quorn.

Once again QPMS would like to acknowledge the funding from the National Radioactive Waste Management Facility – Community Benefit Program obtained by the Flinders Ranges Council for the building of infrastructure. This money is for infrastructure only and is not able to be used by QPMS for restoration etc. The monies used on restoration and associated equipment is raised by QPMS separately.

As community members may have noticed our 12x9 metre workshop [behind existing stone building] was completed late last year. Concreting has been completed and FRC and QPMS are currently working on the relevant electrical and water connections.

With the generous help of a community grant from the Flinders Ranges Council (FRC) internal fit out and initial purchasing of the required tools etc has taken place. It is wonderful to be able to have a clean, dust free area to work in and this will be particularly beneficial when we are completing restorations, painting etc.

The existing stone building is undergoing an electrical fit out managed by the QPMS and security and access has been upgraded last year.

The BBQ shelter is undergoing a revamp with a concrete pad completed and a planned installation of a free electric BBQ similar to the one recently installed in the Bush Tucker Garden. QPMS have been working on cleaning and repainting of the area and anticipate this will be completed in the very near future.

The main pavilion (the area currently bunted off opposite the pool) has been started with the foundations poured just before Christmas. The completion of this 21x40 metre open sided building is expected to be completed in the next few weeks. The floor will be made of a suitable crusher dust and will be installed by FRC. QPMS and FRC are working on the costings and design of some secure areas within the building essential because of the value and importance of some of the items that have already been restored or otherwise acquired.

Longer term FRC is planning to seek funding to install a significant array of solar panels on top of the pavilion to help offset the cost of electricity for the pool and other council facilities. A large tank with connections suitable for CFS use will be installed to store runoff from the pavilion. Water for use throughout the Lions Park and future extension of the Bush Tucker trail will also be drawn from this tank.

There are further plans to extend the bush tucker trail, provide entrance signage and purchase suitable park furniture and details of this will be dependent on the remaining budget.

Whilst QPMS has been busy with the planning, costing and implementation of the above, work has also been taking place on the restoration of machinery and the acquisition of further articles restoration and display. We already have (thanks to the work carried out previously by the Lions) the basis of a significant display.

QPMS is seeking to acquire further items to renovate and display, and seek community support to help achieve this. Primarily we are seeking all types of articles relevant to the agricultural history of the Flinders Ranges and associated items. This includes but is not limited to; farm and other historical machinery, shearing plant, wool presses etc., oil engines and stationary motors, saddlery and associated harness, old tools, blacksmith equipment, mechanical items, scythes etc., household items and other items relevant to the historical period. We are primarily targeting the horse drawn and early tractor period through to the early 1950s but may consider later items.

QPMS is working towards creating a significant and viable museum that reflects displays the districts rich history for both the enjoyment of the local residents and tourists alike. If you are able to contribute or help in any way, please consider contacting us. Any items acquired will be kept under cover where required and secure storage will be provided where possible.

QPMS is also seeking volunteers that are interested in joining our team. All types of skills are required including, mechanical and restoration skills, painting, leatherwork, woodworking skills, assistance with planting watering and other maintenance within the park, signwriting, history gathering, welding and metalwork, research and IT skills, an understanding of the historical period and the machinery we are working with, grant writing skills fund raising and event management skills etc. etc. and of course the desire to join a friendly and welcoming team.

Quorn Pioneer Machinery Society would like to recognize the individual efforts of members input to date.

Working bees are held every Wednesday 9 am to 12pm and Saturdays 1pm to 4 pm. Because of our workload a significant amount of work takes place at other times as well so anytime you see someone onsite, please feel free to approach them with any questions you may have or alternatively contact David on 0401 533 752.

Probus meets the first Tuesday of the month in the Quorn town hall. Any person over sixty five is welcome to attend.





Pictures — From the Past



SOUTH AUSTRALIA had always had to import coal from NSW for its industries. But a coal shortage in 1940 (during the 2nd World War) led the State Government to search for its own workable coal deposits. Boring for it began at Leigh Creek in August 1941 at Glen's Gums (now Telford). By 1944 commercial quantities were being extracted. By 1961 over a million tons were extracted a year, almost all for the Pt Augusta Power Station. The Leigh Ck Mine did much to stabilise SA's economy and helped its industries expand greatly.

The original Leigh Ck town was built for the mine workers over part of the underground coal deposit, so as the open-cut mine worked southwards, the town had to move. The site chosen for the new town from the 18 examined, was by Windy Creek south of the town of Copley. (Not as in 'wind'—it 'winds' a lot, so it's pronounced as in 'wine'), It was at first for a time named Leigh Creek South. The move occurred in 1981.



BECAUSE OF THE urgency of SA finding coal, and of the War, living conditions in the original Leigh Ck town were rough for quite a time. It was not like moving into Leigh Ck South in 1981—then there'd been plenty of time to have the new town already built. The top photo shows the tent lines in the first Leigh Ck in 1948. They were uncomfortable, cold in winter, hot in summer, and likely to be blown away in storms and wind. There was no security, and pay packets had to be carefully hidden. There were many fights, and gambling games proliferated. There was a Mess for eating, but some cooked their meals on primus stoves in their tents. One advantage was electric lighting in the tents. Life improved later with the building of rows of Nissan Huts in the town's northern part (known as 'Silver City' from the sunshine glinting on them), as you can see in the bottom photo on this page.

A 56 page booklet exists, *Leigh Creek—A Town on the Move* (Lutheran Publishing House, Adelaide, undated; c 1980?), produced by Year 10 & 11 students & teachers at the Leigh Ck Area School, with community help. It's profusely illustrated with photos, including all but one of those used here.







THE TOP PHOTO shows typical life in the Tent Lines during the late 1940s. 'Spare time or relaxation was simply a yarn between the tent dwellers...'(p 9).

WATER FOR THE town and mine was a problem. So the Aroona Dam was built over the next 11 years. The Flying Fox (left) was used throughout its building 'to place the cement for the construction of the dam wall' (p 20).

However, the Sliding Rock copper mining town east of Beltana, had had its mines wrecked by constant flooding. So a pipeline from there to Leigh Ck was finished in 1944 to provide it with water, which 'was somewhat harsh and described by the town's people to be very hard, discoloured and rancid' (p 18).

The c 1960 photo above shows the Sliding Rock Pumping Station. It continued operating for longer in case of emergencies at Leigh Ck, and also provided water to some local Stations. (*This Photo by Chris Williams.*)

Along the banks of the Diamentina Tailin' weaners 'cross the clay flats Walking mobs back to the trucking yards, and drafting off the fats.


Whether ridin' on the night watch, Or dragging calves up to the ramp, a familiar place to lay his head, the Stockman's pillow, back at camp.





A cat trap was obtained from the Council depot, a peach and some grapes put in the set trap. Nothing was touched. Probably gone.


Early next morning, there it was, caught in the trap. A brushtail possum.

Perspectives on Covid





Flapjacks Ingredients


250gm porridge oats125gm softened butter, plus extra for tin125gm light brown sugar2-3 tablespoon Golden Syrup1pinch salt

Prep 10 mins Cook Time 15 mins

Serves 6-10.

- 1. Put the oats, butter, sugar and Golden Syrup in a food processor and pulse until mixed– be careful not to overmix.
- 2. Pre heat oven to 180°C.
- 3. Lightly butter a 20 x 20cm baking tin and add the mixture.
- 4. Press into the corners wit the back of a spoon so the mixture is flat.
- 5. Score into squares.
- 6. Bake for around 15 minutes until golden brown.
- 7. Remove from oven and allow to cool. Easily broken into squares and stored in a storage jar.

The Woolshed Flat Station



Fascinating photo at Woolshed Flat Railway Station. A photographer is taking this photo of a photographer taking a photo of the mixed goods & passenger train hauled by Y58 and Y136. The photographer is the blur just right of centre, using a View Camera on a tripod. He puts his head under a black cloth to look through the camera lens itself to line up and focus. Then he removes his head from under the cloth, closes the camera's back, inserts the single negative, tells everyone to stay still, and squeezes a bulb on the end of a tube to take the photo. He's blurred because he's just standing up. These days artists, etc, often blunder by having the photographer *taking* the photo while his/her head is still under the cloth, which is *both* futile, *and* ridiculous!

ON 5_{TH} **SEPTEMBER**, 1867, the Hon P. Santo, then Commissioner of Public Works in South Australia's Parliament, moved in the House of Assembly, 'That it is desirable to bring in a Bill to encourage the formation of a Railway northward from Port Augusta or Port Paterson.'

Woolshed Flat became the main camp, with workshops and offices for the Railway's construction. The land was part of the Woolundunga pastoral lease, that had existed since 1859.

The site was chosen by the successful tenderers, Messrs Barry Brooks & Fraser. The Woolshed Flat Railway Siding was constructed as part of the Great Northern Railway in 1878.




One of the actual photos taken by the Photographer caught in action in the pic at the top of this page. He's moved his View Camera down to be level with the train and its passengers

After the Quorn section was opened, Woolshed Flat became the base for maintaining the line between Saltia and Summit. In those days of coal-fired steam engines, water was crucial, so railway stations were usually built near reliable sources of water, as Woolshed Flat was.



SA Government members of the Pastoral Lands Commission posed by their train, 1891. Telegraph lines are on the upper left. Famous peak at the back is always wrongly labelled 'The Devil's Peak'. But it's not. It's the South Peak, *in front of* the Devil's Peak, which is completely hidden from view

Around 3 km *up* the Waukarie Creek is a permanent spring. And a stone Weir was built below it, still there today, but now choked up. A pipeline was built from it to the railway station. All of these can still be seen today, walking along the Waukarie Ck Trail, 3 km from Olive Grove.



Early photo of The Viaduct across Waukarie Creek, just beside the Woolshed Flat Station. A steam train on the other side of it is on its way to Quorn. And you can see a rider on a horse climbing up the steep slope and along the foot track leading to the station.

Where the Weir is, is one of the most spectacular geological sites in the Flinders. It's well worth visiting, and is a beaut spot for morning or afternoon tea. The Weir's right close on the north side of the Trail, but easy to miss seeing.


The steep gradient between Saltia and Woolshed Flat meant that sometimes an extra locomotive from The Flat was sent to Saltia to help get a train up it. [The report of the September 1951 St Peters College Flinders Hike says the steam-engined Ghan taking them north, took three attempts to get up that gradient.]

During 1881–82 two attached cottages were built to house railway workers. Later another pair were added. The school at Woolshed Flat was opened in 1905 in a room at the end of a row of railway cottages. The teacher's residence was next to the schoolroom.

Woolshed Flat had a steady population. Many of the residents were known as Blockers. They were very determined to make a success of their ventures. This included clearing the land for agriculture, for crops, dairy, and sheep.





In 1956 the gang stationed at Woolshed Flat was transferred to the new standard gauge line. And the last narrow gauge Ghan ran through the Pass to Quorn on 13th August, 1956. The last scheduled rail service between Pt Augusta and Quorn ceased in January 1957.

Quorn Health Services Update

January 2022

Flinders and Upper North Local Health Network information about temporary changes to Quorn Health Services due to COVID-19 and the continuation of medical services in Quorn.

Changes due to COVID-19 Omicron variant

Due to the current COVID-19 situation in South Australia with widespread community transmission of the COVID-19 Omicron variant the Flinders and Upper North Local Health Network (FUNLHN) has implemented its COVID-19 Management Plan.

This plan is based on SA Health modelling, has been extensively planned and adapted to meet the requirements of FUNLHN Health Sites.

To protect FUNLHN staff and to ensure patients and Aged Care Residents at our facilities receive the best care possible the following temporary changes have been made to Quorn Health Service:

- Aged Care Residents from Hawker Memorial Hospital have been temporarily relocated to Quorn Health Service. This allows FUNLHN to keep acute services open at Hawker Memorial Hospital which services the upper Flinders Ranges area.
- Due to the co-location of Flinders House Aged Care at Quorn Health Service it has been necessary to temporarily close the inpatient areas of Quorn Health Service. This is to ensure that our Aged Care Residents continue to receive the care and support they require. It is best practice to keep facilities with Aged Care Residents and inpatient areas separate during a pandemic. To achieve this we have had to temporarily close inpatient areas at Quorn Health Service.
- The Quorn Health Service Emergency Department has been changed to a standalone service separated from the Aged Care facilities. This is to ensure that we keep our Aged Care Residents save from any possible patient presenting to the Emergency Department with COVID-19 symptoms.
- The Quorn Health Service Emergency Department will be open from 8am-4:30pm Monday- Friday and a Senior Registered Nurse will be available after hours and on weekends. Patients requiring Emergency Department Services after hours are encouraged to call ahead on 0428 749 483 and the Nurse will arrange to meet you at the hospital, please wait in your car. As per the usual practice the Registered Nurse will contact the on call Doctor for advice and assistance as required. In an emergency call 000.

Please note these changes are temporary. Once the current COVID-19 situation in South Australia is under control and widespread community transmission is at lower levels FUNLHN will reinstate inpatient care at Quorn Health Service and transfer Aged Care Residents back to Hawker Memorial Hospital.

Medical Services at Quorn - Recruitment of GP

FUNLHN is actively working to find a GP to replace the retiring Dr Tony Lian-Lloyd. The service he has provided over many years to the residents of Quorn and surrounding areas has been substantial and he will be sorely missed by our region.

FUNLHN is working with both the Flinders Ranges Council and the Quorn Health Services Health Advisory Council to ensure there is local input into the recruitment process. Due to the confidential nature of the recruitment process FUNLHN is unable to provide more information to the public at this stage. However initial indications are very positive at this stage.

FUNLHN has also looked at alternatives in case the recruitment of a GP is delayed due to other factors (eg. COVID-19 is affecting medical recruitment across Australia). This may include the provision of a locum service at Quorn until the recruitment process can be finalised.

FUNLHN is committed to ensuring that residents of Quorn and surrounding areas receive a high level of care in their community. The recruitment of a GP and the continuation of medical service in Quorn is a high priority for our Local Health Network.


