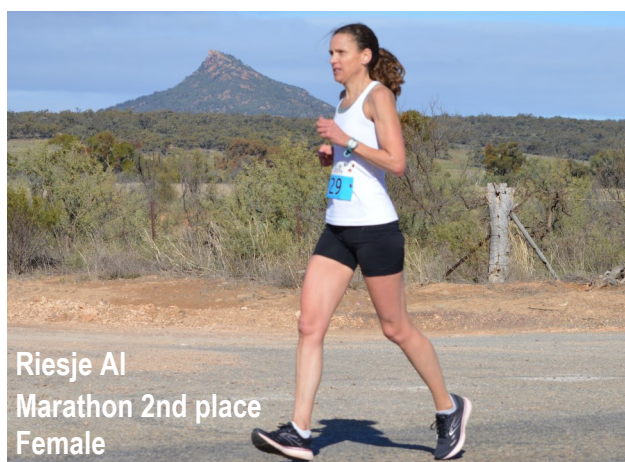

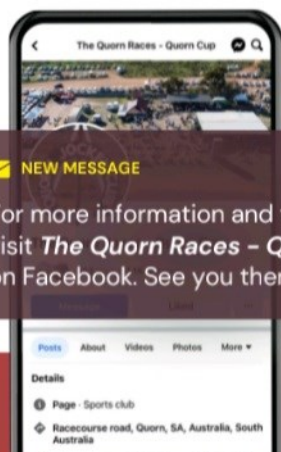

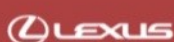

Daniel Kwaterski combined his Marathon Run with the additional kilometres on the day to complete one hundred kms in a fundraiser for *Mindful Aus*. Congratulations Daniel.

Other participants on the day were elite runners Dylan and Jessica Stenson.

Jessica is the Ambassador of the Pichi Richi Marathon, sponsored by Great Northern Lodge. Keeping running in the family, husband Dylan is an 800m specialist while Jess is making her mark in the Marathon.

Jess competed in the 2012 and 2016 Olympics and is a Commonwealth Games Gold medallist in the Marathon. She is the only female Marathon runner from any country to have medalled in the marathon in three different Commonwealth Games, one Gold and two Bronze medals.

They have a son Billy, and their second child is due in September. She vows to be back again to run in the Pichi Richi Marathon as she has enjoyed the experience so much. ■

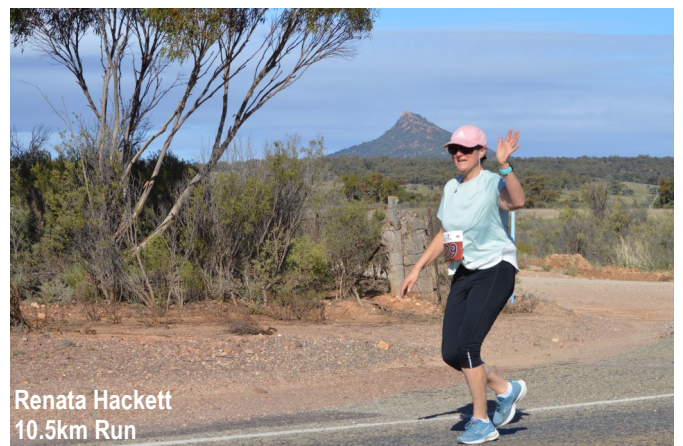

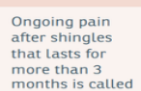

Your Landscape Levy is changing

The SA Arid Lands (SAAL) Landscape Board works with the community, industry, First Nations and government agencies to ensure a sustainable approach to the management, protection and restoration of soil, water, native plants and animals across its vast region, including Quorn and Hawker.

To fund this work, the board collects a Landscape Levy from all ratepayers (formerly known as an NRM levy and collected by local councils as part of rates collection) and this is changing for your council area.

When the SAAL Landscape Board was an NRM Board prior to 2019 (operating under the *Natural Resources Management Act 2004*), Coober Pedy and Roxby Downs councils were the only councils in the SA Arid Lands region.

In 2019, under the new *Landscape South Australia Act 2019* which replaced the NRM Act, the Flinders Ranges and Port Augusta councils were brought in the SAAL region. These councils were previously serviced as part of Northern and Yorke.

A different levy rate was being applied to Port Augusta than to the Flinders Ranges and both were different to that of Coober Pedy and Roxby Downs.

This year, the SAAL Landscape Board introduced a way to ensure everyone across the region was paying the same amount, based on land use, known as a Landscape Levy equalisation process.

From 1 July 2023, the regional landscape levy will be applied as a fixed charge that depends on your land use. Land uses are primary production, commercial/industrial and residential, vacant or other. Primary production properties, which receive the greatest benefits from natural resources management and the board's programs, will pay more than other land use types.

A base rate of \$45.35 will be paid on residential land, vacant land and other, with commercial and industrial properties paying \$90.69 and primary production paying \$226.73. This aligns with a *beneficiary pays* principle and reflects the way in which our community uses and benefits from the sustainable use of natural resources.

Primary producers with more than one property within The Flinders Ranges District Council area may be eligible to have their property classified as a single farm enterprise, meaning the Landscape Levy would be charged only once. Contact your council to determine your eligibility.

Feedback on the levy equalisation proposal was sought through public consultation during November 2022.

Quorn Pioneer Machinery Society Update

ON THE 15th MAY Quorn Pioneer Machinery Society after a good deal of work and planning opened the Quorn RV Park. The purpose of this facility for a limited amount [currently eight sites] of fully self-contained Recreational Vehicles is to raise funds for the Agricultural Museum that is being developed in the Lions Park Quorn.

The site has been developed after the relevant planning approvals had been investigated and the process of community consultation had taken place with significant public support for the proposal. QPMS has ,while developing the plans, made it clear that the park should fit into the environment without the need to cut down trees or otherwise having a negative effect on the landscape or the Quorn community. We hope that we have achieved this.

The RV Park has been laid out with all sites and internal roadways receiving a gravelled base. This is to avoid indiscriminate driving in the park with the consequent environmental impact. QPMS has also begun to plant suitable native local species to maintain and further develop the parks environment and amenity. There is also a no fires and firewood gathering policy in place.

As part of the overall improvements to the Lions Park QPMS has had initial discussion

with the Flinders Ranges Council around rejuvenation of the Avenue of Honour in the park and further detail of what is being proposed will be announced in the very near future. This along with the soon to arrive park furniture funded by the Quorn Lions Club will further improve the park.

Patronage of the RV park has been good with the park at full capacity on several occasions. Feedback from our customers has been overwhelmingly positive with location and park environment being commented on. We have already had several repeat visitors and are receiving positive recommendations on Wikicamps. This is contrary to a letter published in last months Mercury stating that the project was 'doomed'.

It is pleasing to get positive feedback from various Quorn businesses that are enjoying patronage from some of our customers. The RV Park will be run from mid-March till the end of October, with it being closed over the summer period.

Finally, and most importantly, profits from the establishment and success of this project will go towards funding, restoring, maintaining and developing a viable, relevant and important facility that curates some of our local history as well as being a tourist attraction. ■

Grazing course designed for SA Arid Lands

A Southern Rangelands Grazing Land Management course, tailor-made for the SA Arid Lands region, will be offered at 11 different locations in August and October this year.

Having identified a need through landholder engagement for a regionally delivered training program for producers, property managers, workers and contractors, the SA Arid Lands Landscape Board has sourced funding and worked with Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) to develop an EDGENetwork workshop to meet this purpose.

The one-day workshop will be open to all SA Arid Lands residents with an interest in the pastoral industry. This includes red meat and wool producers, pastoral managers, station hands, contractors, advisors and students interested in a future in the pastoral industry.

SA Arid Lands Landscape Board Regional Agriculture Landcare Facilitator Andrea Tschirner said participants would learn more about grazing land management, the fundamentals of rangeland soils and livestock production in a one day course that will include a combination of classroom learning and hands-on training.

“On completion, you will be able to identify land types and native pasture plants, develop strategies to manage land condition, better manage nutrition requirements of livestock and estimate your long and short-term carrying capacity,” Mrs Tschirner said.

“Applying the concepts to your own business, you will take away climate, resource, livestock and paddock profiles that are specialised for your property.”

Participation in the new course will be fully subsidised through the From the Ground Up project, which is delivered by the SA Arid Lands Landscape Board, through funding from the Australian Government’s Future Drought Fund.

Workshops will be delivered at Mungerannie, Lyndhurst, Blinman, Bindarra, Yunta, Quorn, Stirling North, Mount Eba, Oodnadatta, Coober Pedy and Nonning. Seven sessions will be offered in August, with the remaining four to be offered in October

Registrations opened on the 7th June for all workshops and early registrations were encouraged to ensure participants can attend the session that best suits their location.

“This is a rare opportunity to undertake professional development training tailored made for our pastoral industry, where everyone has an opportunity to attend at a location close to them,” Mrs Tschirner said.

MLA Project Manager for Adoption Southern & Western Production Systems Mitchell Plumbe highlighted the value of a partnership between Meat & Livestock Australia and the South Australia Arid Lands Landscape Board.

“Red meat producers in the southern rangelands can look forward to a new regionalised training program to help upskill in grazing management and livestock production.”

“The EDGENetwork is a longstanding program that brings research and local knowledge together into a practical workshop for red meat producers.”

“MLA has developed the customised program with a team of researchers, extension officers and advisors throughout the southern rangelands who know the landscape and the production systems in these areas.”

From the Ground Up focuses on healthy soils and rest-based grazing systems and supports leaders in the grazing community to discuss and trial new innovative ideas and methods relating to grazing management in the pastoral country. It complements the board’s Building Pastoral Sustainability project.

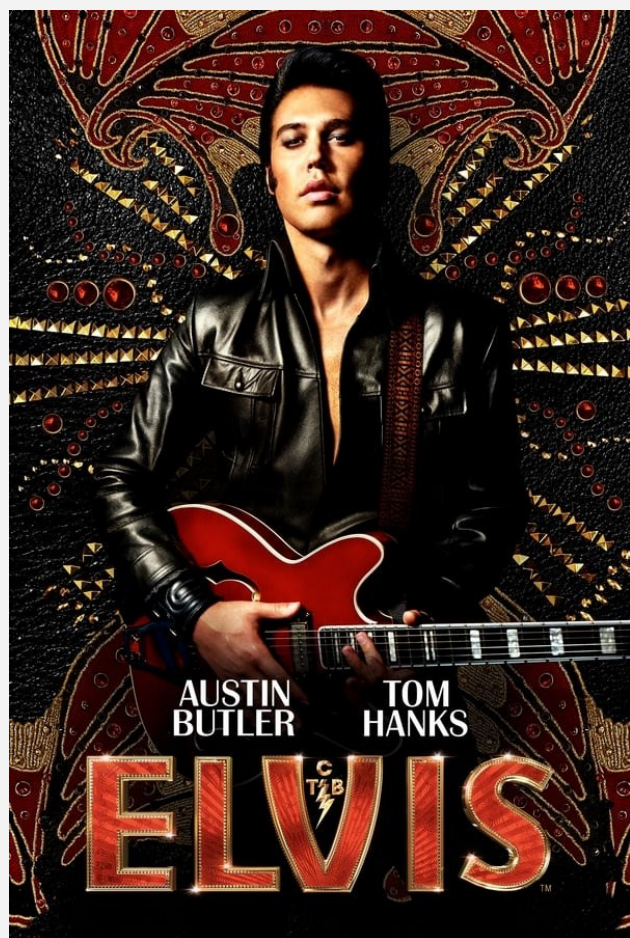

Education in the Quorn Area

THE FIRST SCHOOL recorded in this area was in 1864 at Saltia after that town was established in 1862.

This was 14 years before Quorn was surveyed.

Schools in the district were opened when there was a minimum of 6 children enrolled. Schools closed when there were less than 6 children enrolled. These schools were called Provisional Schools.

There have been 25 schools in the district, with only 1 remaining now. (Quorn Area School since 1968)

There are very few photos available today of these schools.

Education was always important to the families who travelled far from their birthplaces / homelands to make a new life in South Australia. The first settlers had to teach their children, but as the district grew and the population increased, the people got together and agitated for the provision of a school within reasonable distance of their homes. Many were prepared to assist in either providing land, building materials, time or money to obtain a building and a teacher to serve the needs of their community. This included, in some instances, paying for their children to attend school.

Students often had to travel several miles each way to school, and most had to walk, the lucky ones being able to ride a horse or travel by pony trap. As well as attending daily school, they also needed to do their chores at home before and after school each day.

Schools were located as centrally as possible to the populated areas, thus it was not unusual for a school to be moved to another location as the local population diminished. The site of Mt Brown School was changed 3 times. Firstly, it was located about 2 miles north of Lehmann's property, Hd Woolundunga. It then moved out of this council area to 'The Gunyah', and then to Fraser's property.

Names of schools did not always indicate their locality, and some schools had their names changed. This caused much confusion.

Pichi Richi School was not at the town of Pichi Richi, but in then Yarrah Vale District, Hd Pichi Richi.

Willochra School was not in the Hd Willochra, but at Willochra Town in the Hd Boolcunda.

Richmans Creek School was renamed Itali Itali to avoid confusion with Richman Valley School.

Boolcunda East and Boolcunda West Schools became confusing, so the name of the latter was changed to Castle Springs.

Saltia School, the first in the district, had an average of 20 children attending daily in it's first year. Most of the students would have been from the families of teamsters who made their homes at Saltia.

As well as normal school hours, evening classes were conducted for older students unable to attend during the day. Records refer to the school being held in the chapel.

Children from Woolshed Flat attended Saltia School until it finally closed at the end of 1905, having served the area continuously for 41 years.

St Joseph's Convent at Saltia was located on the Port Augusta side of the road on allotment No 5. According to records in 2000, this block was still owned by the Catholic Diocese of Port Pirie. There were 2 teaching sisters at the school. Alas, there is no further information available.

Woolshed Flat School opened when Saltia closed in 1905. This school was held in a room at the end of the railway cottages with an average daily attendance of 12.5 in the first year.

Arden Vale School in 1882, was a weatherboard structure. Enrolment was 23 students.

In 1906 a stone building was erected by a Mr F Schumann and sons of Wyacca with the stone quarried in the district. This school had periods of closure and periods of part-time opening owing to student numbers in the district.

From 1920 to 1959, the school continuously provided education for the 21 families living in the district.

The late Mary Fitzgerald served this school from 1921 until its closure in 1959. Mary then transferred to Quorn and retired in 1962 giving 42 years of dedicated service to education in the Quorn district.

This school, like most in the district had School Picnic days. Arden Vale held these days at Kiln Creek.

In 1942, during daylight saving, school commenced at 10.15am and finished at 4.45pm.

Barrandilkie School was a stone building erected by the local population on Hd Palmer and was on property owned by the Twopenny family. Average daily attendance was 20 in the first year. Enrolments declined and the school closed in 1892.

Boolcunda East School had three locations – Section 54 Hd Mookra, Section 38 Mookra, Section 76 Hd Mookra.

In 1890 a Mr Rushbridge gave a piece of land to the community for the purpose of erecting a hall. This was a stone building to be used as a church, school and social centre. Keeping permanent teachers at the school was an issue which caused the school to close and open a few times before finally re-opening in 1932 in an old stone building on a Mr Tom Cobiack's property.

Boolcunda West (Castle Springs School) A building made of wood and iron construction was erected on land owned by a Mr Henry Noll. This building was owned by the Education Department. In 1895, the school was re-named Castle Springs, to stop confusion with Boolcunda East School.

Bruce, originally, was a building of wood and iron which was destroyed by fire in 1937. All records from before this time were lost, but it is known that up to 45 students attended the school. A 4.8m square weatherboard building was erected in its place, when in 1946, and 24 students attending, it was necessitated to move to a larger building to accommodate the high number of students. The move was to a railway building. The school closed at the end of that year. ■
