Charlie King Visits Quorn

My WIFE ANNETTE and I were transferred to Quorn from Lock by Elders Stock agent during 1972 after Kevin Leslie approached Mr Bob Dunsford, Elders Branch Dept. manager in Head Office Currie street Adelaide to appoint an Elders representative to be based at Quorn. Kevin and Bill Leslie agreed to rent their house on the property known as Barrindilke.

Our daughter Margaret had commenced her schooling at Lock with our son Tim, commencing his schooling at Quorn. On his first day the Pinkerton creek was in full flood which resulted in Mr Frank Roberts, local grazier driving him across in his Toyota Land Cruiser.

I can still remember my first week meeting all Elders and opposition clients. Lyall and Bert Francis were the first followed by Jimmy Britza, Huey Schnell, Claud Stokes, Joe Zanet and the FitzGerald's, just to name a few.

Back in those days Annette and Ian were in their mid-thirties with plenty of energy. Ian was selling houses and property under the Elders real Estate license held in head Office Currie Street Adelaide also selling livestock, wool & merchandise.



The property, Annette and Ian purchased back in 1975, is where Charlie King as a teenager and his family were renting from Mrs French in the early sixties.

It was a tremendous surprise to have Charlie King and all of his relatives visit our property on 2nd November 2022 to view the autograph that Charlie wrote in green paint when he was 16 years of age. It is still in an excellent condition and is located on a sheet of iron inside one of the original sheds. It is the only original shed left on our property. Annette and Ian will always treasure this autograph.

Charlie King's Mother has fond, but hard memories of the house, carting water in a bucket for washing, a chip bath heater, no running water in the kitchen or connected to any part of the house or garden.



We rented Barrindilki for approx. 3 years, then the opportunity came along to purchase our property from Mr Les Brewster.

Our property, now known as "Martimia" was owned by Mr Edward Francis Lynch, Storekeeper of Quorn from the 18th day of September 1879. In August 1950 Mr John Frederick Roberts sold the property to Laura Anne Violet French, who then sold to Leslie Nathan Brewster of Quorn Farmer on 10th February 1965.

When we purchased the property in 1975, it was in a similar condition as when the King family rented the house from Mrs French. Mrs King can remember the two cows Mrs French would milk to supply milk to people in Quorn. We connected water to the house by laying pipe from S.A. water metres. The trench was dug by us with crowbar, pick and shovel.

I can still remember Leigh Lewis, the local electrician at the time buying a new "Ditch Witch" trencher for his electrical work. Leigh said, "I will dig the trench". He covered 2 metres in three hours, deciding the ground and rocks were too tough for his machine. We had a long drop toilet, later we upgraded to a bucket. Then the time came when we installed a septic tank, the hole and soakage pit was again dug with a crow bar, pick and shovel. French drains came in later. I serviced my private vehicles back then, therefore I needed a service pit, which was dug by the same method.

We were very fortunate, during my travels with Elders to notice a man laying bricks for a fence around a house in Quorn. Knowing that we were looking for a builder to do the extensions and upgrade our toilet, bathroom and laundry areas, I pulled up and it happened to be Doug Kite. I asked Doug, "Are you interested in inspecting our proposed project?" From then on the besser bricks were ordered and Doug travelled out of the hills where he owned a property each week end.

We dug the foundations and Doug would instruct me to have all the preparations ready for the next week end. I made sure the instructions were carried out, even sometimes I would be working late at night after working for Elders during the day. There were no angle grinders back in those days. The iron was scored with a sharp blade made on the end of a file. Same as building a fence or putting a roof on a shed, it was all clouts, roofing nails, no such thing as tek screws back then. It took 12 months of weekends to finish the renovations, then came the tiling which both Annette and Ian accomplished.

Then came the concreting, all around the house. It would take 7 X 40 kg bags cement for one slab which resulting in the finishing off taking until the early hours of the morning.

The kitchen cupboards were purchased from a Company called "U install it", situated on Anzac Highway in Adelaide. The measurements of the kitchen area were taken and the cupboards were delivered. Then we installed the excellent product. There had to be a few minor adjustments as rooms are not exactly square but never the less we were very pleased with the finished job.

All sheds on the property were erected by us except the 60 X 40 cyclone shed. Maurice Hannigan assisted with the 30 foot beam and the clear span trusses. We borrowed a theodolite from Harold Eckert to take the levels on the proposed site.

The middle shed was erected by Ian during his long service leave from Elders. He lived in a caravan in the sheep yards, again using a bucket toilet and showering at the caravan park as tenants were occupying our house.

All the property required new fences. I can remember steel pickets and creosote posts were the same price at \$1.00 each. A lot of difference now! There are many challengers ahead when buying a rural property whilst working for a stock firm particularly without the modern luxuries in the house, although we did have a

kitchen sink, without taps or water drainage and a Meters wood stove, there were four main rooms plus a kitchen. All the walls in each room needed the plaster removed back to the stone work, stones re pointed with Dribond – a new product on the market, then re plastered with a mixture of, sand and cement, then panelled with timber panel board. The fifteen foot high ceilings were then lowered to nine foot with a suspended ceiling product, consisting of aluminium angle, steel rods, with panels of 3 inch foam with a white vinyl finish.

All this work was completed by Ian with help from Annette when not committed to her other family duties. Annette painted the whole exterior of the house and the new interior walls of the new extensions.

Whilst we were at Barindilki, Kevin & Bill Leslie allowed us to keep a cow on their property. We purchased a Friesian cow and calf from Hans Friedinger and named her Bessie. We shifted Bessie to our Quorn property. We purchased a yearling Hereford bull from Gladstone market for Bessie but after a big flood which washed the old fence away, the bull was never seen again, although attempts were made to try to find him.

Mr Rex Finlay gave us a lovely dog named Oilgle, I would tell Oilgle to "go and get the sheep", and he would bring them back to the yards. A farmer from Baroota gave me a pup, we named him Bandit, he would follow Oilgle, and then when Oilgle passed away, Bandit followed the same instruction. I arrived back from Port Augusta one day after working for Elders all day, and was cleaning out the sheep trough, I instructed Bandit to go and get the sheep, he never returned. I purchased another dog but it was difficult to train it when time was a factor.

I can remember our first shearing on the Quorn property, 40 sheep were given in with the sale of the property. I made a very make shift yard as there was no shearing shed. The floor was hessian bags, then I contacted Lyall Francis for a loan of his portable Crutcher. Later when Lyall came to pick up his plant, he said, I thought you were only going to crutch them. I learnt how to shear in my teenage years, not quick but I knew how to get the wool off. We have since built yards, with a small shearing shed.

We purchased two ponies from Rex Finlay, they were unbroken, one we named Tangles (Tim's pony), the other Shep (Margaret's pony). Then came buying saddles, bridles, saddle cloths. With the help of Lyall Francis, Pam Hombsch and Leo & Nancy Murray we were able to have the ponies fully equipped and quiet.

A very good friend of mine and Elders client Joe Zanet said I have a few pigs for sale which I will take to the next Gladstone market, indicating that there will be space on the car trailer for more pigs from other farmers, if the pigs are delivered to the Quorn sale yards. Joe agreed to take them to the market with his trailer but when the time came Joe had other commitments with his garage, then known as Quorn Motors.

Deciding not to sell his pigs, but agreeing to lend his trailer to Ian for delivery of the pigs to Gladstone market which happened without a problem until the next morning, when Southern Farmers, an opposition agent had reported Ian to Elders head office for carting stock to a market with a company vehicle. A report was given on the incident and I was told to remove the tow bar. This made it difficult for the family holidays for towing our camper van.

We borrowed Joe Zanet's car trailer for moving our furniture from Barindilki to our new property in Quorn.

Ian purchased a pure white week old heifer calf from Gladstone market which came from a well-known stud property. The stud master said he normally would not sell the heifers but being pure white they tend to have cancer later in life. The calf was delivered to Quorn in the boot of Elders car because there was no towbar. Our children had fun feeding the calf with a bottle, we named her "Milky". She turned out a nice cow but did eventually die of cancer.

Part of my employment with Elders at Quorn was on each Wednesday to canvas farmers in the Mambray Creek area. During one of my visits I called on Les Coe who at the time was cleaning his boat for sale, with a 25 HP

Evinrude motor. Les said "Do you want to buy my boat for \$2,000, it is advertised in the local paper?" At first I said no, then after leaving his property, I returned to buy the boat. We stayed in the Tumby Bay cabins to try the boat, catching a nice lot of fish, then one day when the sea was too rough, we went for a walk along the shack area, noticing an Elders sign on a shack for sale. The Elders representative in charge of selling the property said, "I will delist the property", allowing us to deal direct with the owner. He also commented, "Surely Elders can do something for their staff". We purchased the shack.

Ian when attending Urrbrae High School and before had always wanted to be a farmer. He would go to his uncle's farm at Dartmoor, Victoria regularly on school holidays and for work experience at Pinnaroo during the Christmas holidays.

I applied to buy farms at Penola with the AMP scheme but farmers sons were selected owing to the availability of machinery.

Elders were not in favour of us owning our own property, then eventually the Elders supervisor wanted us to shift, although the Elders business at Quorn was very strong. They offered Strathalbyn or managing the merchandise business at Port Augusta. Ian chose Port Augusta, to give our children a chance to finish their schooling at Quorn and to finish the development of our property. I had to surrender the company vehicle, then went to Farley Ford to buy the cheapest motor bike which was a 125cc Yamaha.

Elder's salary was low, on call 24/7 with no paid overtime. I was determined to never be late for work, resulting in a million dollar turnover in a short time, far in excess of previous years. The little bike was changed to a 250cc Honda. I rode a motor bike for five years, then was given a Company vehicle for a Merchandise manager's position covering Port Augusta,



Quorn, Hawker, Melrose, and Orroroo.

We will both always cherish our small hobby farm at Quorn, it is now 50 years since we were shifted to Quorn and it is surprising what can be achieved with very little financial backing, without a degree or certificate, as the saying goes "Where there is a will, there is a way", There will be many hurdles to jump and a lot criticism to deal with, but at the end of the day you will come out on top.



Similar to how

Charlie King rose to the top and we wish him and his family all the best in the future.

Recipe

Quick Chicken Curry

300g frozen Mixed Vegetables

500g Chicken pieces

2 tblsp Green Curry paste

1 can Coconut Cream

1 cup Chicken stock



Heat wok /frying pan. Add curry paste and stir briefly. Add chicken and stir fry, tossing so paste doesn't burn.

Add coconut cream and stock and bring to boil. Add vegetables. Reduce heat and simmer for approx. 10 minutes. Serve with rice.

Variations - replace green curry paste with red curry paste. Some curry pastes are hot. To reduce this, add some fresh lemon or lime juice to cool the heat.

Transperineal Biopsy Machine

MAYOR KEN ANDERSON attended the launch of the new transperineal biopsy machine at Port Augusta Hospital in December.

The Flinders Ranges Council donated \$5000 to towards the \$90,000 cost of the machine, which will enable men in the Upper Spencer Gulf and Mid North at risk of prostate cancer, to be checked locally, instead of making an overnight trip to Adelaide.

The instigator of raising money for the machine, Steve Fawcett, on behalf of the Lions Club stated 'From a health perspective, the country is a very poor cousin to the city' and that having to stay in Adelaide overnight or for an extended period all adds up, so it costs a lot more for country people to get a health service equal to the city.

Money was donated through the Postie Bike run, The Trapper Bar (Mambray Creek), charity events run by Barrie Cotton, family and friends, and by local donors.

Ken Anderson said the machine now offered a safer, better view of the prostate gland, to make cancers more detectable and less traumatising for the patient undergoing the process. He said doctors often had to reassure men needing a biopsy, who experienced the older procedure, that the experience under general anaesthetic would be much more comfortable. 'They tend to be quite comfortable when they wake up, and to recover quickly'. It is a valued piece of equipment not only for local, but regional men too.

Murray River Flood

QUORN SES UNIT responded to a request for volunteers to help out with flood preparedness and monitoring in late 2022 and early 2023.

Frank Lyman was the first to be deployed, travelling to Murray Bridge, where he was involved with the construction of Defencell Levee Banks and other duties, to protect low-lying sections of the town from the advancing flood waters.

In early December I was deployed to Mannum, again constructing Defencell Levee Banks in the town centre to protect homes and businesses.

Then in early January this year John Simpson and I drove to Renmark, and were assigned to backing up the local SES Unit, logistical support and monitoring levee banks and the advancing flood peak.

We were just a few of the hundreds who were, and still are, engaged in flood-related work along the Murray. They include Council workers and earthmoving contractors, as well as CFS and SES volunteers from SA, and SES swift water rescue crews from NSW, who arrived with boats and Unimog trucks. The earthmoving plant included skid-steers, loaders, excavators, graders, pad-foot rollers and semi tippers.

The extensive network of levee banks constructed around Murray River towns is mind-boggling. Many new clay banks were built, and many old ones built for previous floods, were repaired and topped-up. The work was carried out to a high standard, with the new banks being keyed-in and clay spread, watered and compacted in layers, until the required height was reached. Where there was not enough room to build earth banks, or they were not quite high enough, Defencells were used. They consist of a line of geotextile and mesh baskets which are keyed-in, linked together and filled with sand. These are then protected by plastic sheeting held in place by sand bags.

It was an honour to be part of this huge undertaking, which has hopefully minimised the impact of the flood on River Murray Communities. John Badman ■











Flood Response

FLOODING ACROSS THE states has seen hundreds of volunteers, Government agencies and affected community members all working together to assist others.

Community members from the Flinders Ranges council district travelled over to assist in the emergency operations. Volunteers including Modras Ozlins, John Badman, John Simpson and Ken Anderson (DEW) from Quorn. Other volunteers for SES and Hawker, undertook works ranging from assisting to operate the Incident Control Centre in Murray Bridge, to working alongside Defence Force personnel, attending to emergency call-outs.

Also working as part of the response teams were the NSW Rural Fire service, and Queensland personnel, who were tasked with their special operations helicopter and Swift Water rescue team to attend to call-outs ranging from house boats breaking free from their moorings, assisting persons in distress and removing very large items such as water tanks, large gas bottles and debris being washed down the river in the flooding waters.

Our community members also assisted in Levi inspections teams, public notification and welfare teams, assisting in delivery and operation of large and small pumps to protect assets and buildings and repairs of levees and protection barriers.

It was an amazing display of great Australian spirit, and volunteers helping, not only their own communities, but others in need. Well done to all who helped in any way, including those who donated to charities assisting those affected by the floods.

River Murray Flood

THE CATCHMENT AREA Spans 3 states and many other quite large rivers. SA's contribution to the flow is very minimal.

Over the years as trade on the river increased so did development in the basin. One of these developments was shacks. from the humble tin shed for fishermen, to what is now luxurious accommodation. Houseboats and all sorts of other rivercraft now ply the waters regularly. Ski boats on a busy long weekend are the most prolific but the little rocket ship jet skis come a close second.

My family first bought an outboard runabout in the late 60s and started water skiing at white sands just downstream from Murray bridge. Learning to water ski was such great fun both for the adults and the children alike.

As the years progress and skills improved so did the quality and speed of the ski boats. Boating became addictive and parents and friends all bought their own boats, space along the public areas of the river became very crowded, sometimes it was impossible to get a park along the shoreline. In the 1970s many people started to build shacks so that they could have their own private beach area and somewhere to stay over the weekend.

Most of the shacks were built at ground level but after the 1974 floods the regulation was bought in to raise shacks onto 2 metre high pylons. The lower area of these shacks were not to be enclosed other than a wet area. There was no solid fencing allowed, this was so that at high river flows erosion and damage would be restricted and the river flow unimpeded.

Flooding is a normal part of the river flow but unfortunately short memories by some see

development happening in the flood zone with consequential panic and losses. I have included photos of the family shack at Scotts Creek, just downstream from Morgan.

The Cost of Renewables

THE PROBLEM WITH Parliament House Canberra is ministers become so isolated they may as well be on a spaceship.

So when eminent engineers and nuclear scientists, with a combined 500 years of real-life international experience at the top level of complex power systems and an alphabet of letters after their names from PhDs to OAMs come into Parliament House, wouldn't you think government MPs would want to listen to these people?

Apparently Energy and Climate Change Minister Chris Bowen - a former Fairfield councillor and political adviser - knows more about powering the largest grid on Earth than they do.

The Teals must believe they are satisfied with their enlightenment and require no further knowledge, as they also failed to attend the two-day Power Generation in Australia's Clean Energy Future conference featuring engineers who have worked on the most complex systems on Earth.

They should have heard the warning that we are betting the entire Australian economy on a net-zero scheme that cannot work, on renewable systems that are not significantly reducing emissions and that the actual cost of renewables to 2050 to us is an estimated \$1.2 trillion.

Despite repeated invitations, Mr Bowen could not make it to a moment of the two-day conference, about a two-minute walk from his desk. He could have even asked questions.

He would have learnt that the transition is not cheaper. That once we build wind factories over our prime agricultural land, dig up our National Parks for high-voltage transmission lines, chop down our state forests for solar panels, the electricity price we pay will never go down - because we will never stop rebuilding them.

Minister Bowen uses costs as an excuse for why he won't consider nuclear -yet engineer Dr David Hayden Collins, using AEMO figures, calculates the first generation of renewable capital at \$383bn. When you include the costs of replacing batteries every 15 years, and wind towers and solar every 20 years to 2050, the cost is five times greater than what Bowen has budgeted -and it's all still reliant on fossil fuel backup power.

Where we once built power stations that would serve three generations on Australian resources, under Bowen's plans, we will be relying on Chinese-imported batteries that won't see your child go from nappies to their Year 9 NAPLAN test.

Wind towers and solar panels must be pulled down and replaced every 20 years. Then we must figure out where to bury them - three times before 2050. There is no viable method to recycle wind factories or solar, so they get thrown into landfill.

As NSW virtue-signals on banning plastic straws at the pub, all states will need giant landfills for expired renewable junk.

Minister Bowen's plan requires at least 28,000km of new transmission lines. His government signed off on Malcolm Turnbull's legacy project, which will rip up 8iha of Kosciuszko National Park to erect a 330-kilovolt overhead double-circuit transmission line connecting Snowy Hydro 2.0 to the Australian energy market.

This will be repeated over and across regional Australia, with solar and wind farms stamped over prime agricultural land from as far as Melton, Ballarat, Hume and New England needed to power Sydney and Melbourne.

While Minister Bowen couldn't make it, his Department of Climate Change in another room briefed out its community batteries program, where they will spend more than the average Australian does on their house on Chinese batteries they don't expect to last the decade.

Once each community solar battery - at a price to the taxpayer of about \$550,000 each - dies for good, we will be dropped in an international bidding war for more Chinese-made batteries that rely on rare minerals to produce.

This is why no other G20 nation is looking at a grid solely powered by intermittent flows. As we rely on batteries, solar panels and wind turbines made in China, we impoverish

Australia before an aggressive socialist behemoth that has no interest in us having a robust economy.

If Bowen had come to the conference, he would have heard not only are we weakening our grid, but we will be expecting it to do more.

When his 2050 policy says everything from cars to cement plants will be electric, we will need a 215 per cent increase on the 200 terawatt hours of electricity we generate now.

He also would have heard advice from the International Energy Association that you need nuclear to decarbonise. From electrical engineers like James Fleay, who deployed major solar farms and built deep sea gas projects, to Professor Stephen Wilson, who developed the bankability model to store Hungary's gas in an old oilfield after Putin turned off the gas tap from Russia.

He could have heard from Dr David Hayden Collins, who cannot believe we are destroying the environment to apparently save the planet.

He could have learnt that Canada leads the way with small modular nuclear reactors, the only low-emission power generator that can operate reliably, independent of the weather. That fission reactors can give an infinite supply of energy on just over a hectare of land, plugged into the existing grid with no extra transformers necessary.

And those at the conference wanted to hear from Bowen too. Why does he say nuclear is too expensive when more than 30 countries in the world rely on nuclear and pay less for power than we do? Why are family energy bills on nuclear in Canada, South Korea, the US, Taiwan and China half of ours?

When Bowen tells his colleagues in Question Time that no one will accept nuclear in their electorate, why are millions of Londoners and New Yorkers happy to live within 60km of a nuclear power plant?

Why do protesters in Finland wave "Go Nuclear" placards? Why have the Finnish Greens adopted it? Why has California's parliament voted 157 to 3 to keep their last remaining nuclear power plant open?

The shame is Minister Bowen can go to the dispatch box every day and repeat the junk-level sugar advice he readily accepts. If he could spend just one conversation with any systems engineer, he would learn the crisis we are leaping towards. If a single engineer could replace the swagger of Bowen at the dispatch

box with the cogent details of the grid before us, Australia would be better informed, better placed and less afraid.

Minister Bowen's office on the blue carpet was a few hundred metres away from the room of experts on Thursday after the house rose and on Friday when he was tweeting victoriously of his electric vehicle discount passing the Senate.

Just a few small steps for a very fit man could have led to a giant leap in his knowledge.




Kindy Book Launch

Wednesday 7th of December 2022 was a very exciting day for the children of Quorn Kindergarten because they were launching their very own picture book!



Quorn Mercury Revisited



10 Years Ago

Your worship the Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen, boys and girls; last year I was honoured to receive the Quorn Citizen of the Year Award. I told you why I do so much volunteer work. This year I would like to talk to you about the changes I have seen in Quorn, Australia and the world during my lifetime.

As a young girl I lived at Olive Grove, at the end of Richman Valley. The family had to travel by horse and cart to get to church each Sunday; it felt like the middle of the night when we set off. Now a car can make the journey in 20 minutes. We only travelled to Port Augusta once a

year, to attend the Quorn picnic, and back then a chop picnic was just that. We took chops, bread and sauce and that was our picnic. Nowadays we take everything but the kitchen sink to a picnic.

We had no electricity at Olive Grove, so no fridges, television or other electronic entertainment. It was a wonderful treat when the family moved into Quorn and we had electric light and other mod cons. We didn't even have a phone until the late 1950's. All messages had to be delivered by horse and cart, and later by motor vehicles.

We did all our shopping in Quorn as there were three grocery shops as well as the existing four hotels, a barber shop, two banks, a bakery, two butcher's shops, and a garage—everything a community needed to survive. There was even a grocery shop in North Quorn! The road to Port Augusta was all dirt and a little rough back in the old days. When the road was finally bituminised it made the journey a lot smoother and faster. It also made it easier for banks and other facilities to close, as people could make the journey to Port Augusta for work, entertainment and shopping.

The railway used to be the backbone of our community, along with farming. It is good to see that the Pichi Richi Railway continues to bring tourists to our town, ensuring its survival. Our families rarely went out for meals, not like we do now. Only very special occasions meant an outing to the local pub or restaurant.

I played basketball as a girl on a dirt court at the oval. The court was situated about where the bar shed is now located. Netball was played in later years on the courts opposite the Mill. Quorn has always had a reputation for being good sportsmen and women. This hasn't changed over the years, only where the sport is played these days. Not being able to play football on the local oval, for example, has not stopped our youth from playing; they just play out of town.

Jim and I travelled quite extensively over the years both in Australia and overseas. We always felt that Australia is the best country in the word to live in after seeing how people in other countries managed. I still feel that way about Australia, and more particularly about Quorn.




