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Walking Trails

All five Trails cleared and signposted 1–4 offer spectacular Summit Views

1. The Dutchman's Stern Park

Drive 8.5 km via Arden Vale Rd from Quorn to Car Park 10.6 km circuit (easier clockwise) or 8.4 km return via Terrace/Northern Trail or 6 km return to Stony Creek Lookout or 5 km return to Terrace Lookout

2. Warren Gorge

Drive 22 km via Arden Vale Rd from Quorn to Trailhead 5.2 km circuit (easier clockwise)

3. Devil's Peak

Drive 10 km via Richman Valley Road & Devil's Pk Rd to start 2.6 km return (some scrambling last 300 m near top)

4. Mount Brown Park

Drive 14 km via Richman Valley Road to Olive Grove to start 15 km circuit or 12 km return via Western Trail or 5.4 km return to Bald Hill Lookout

5. Waukarie Creek

Drive 14 km via Richman Valley Road to Olive Grove to start 12 km return to Woolshed Flat Railway Station or 2 km return to Heysen Trail Shelter

Dawn Service at Cradock

CRADOCK ANZAC DAY Dawn Service - Had a great day, commenced at 6am for a catch up then 6.30am for the ceremony to commence. Had about 80 attending. Unfortunately, being a week day a number of folk were unable to attend due to business, work or personal circumstance.

Among the attendees was Ken Anderson, Mayor of the Flinders Ranges Council who gave a very in-depth presentation relating to not only the history of Anzac but also the different conflicts we have 'recently' engaged in such as Iraq and Afghanistan and the unfortunate impact they had on the lifestyles on many of our serving members and those who had left the military.

In addition to our Mayor, was the unannounced presence of a SA politician— Leon Bignell MP. He arrived without notice and caught up with many of the folk attending the service. Apparently he was a media correspondent before becoming a pollie. He really appreciated what we presented during the service and the presentation of our Memorial Garden.

The morning ceremony also included a dedication of our latest on-site memorial being a backlit metal sculptured silhouette of a Light-horseman crafted by an artist from Port Broughton. The Light-horseman commemorates the local Cradock District members who enlisted in the 3rd the 9th and the 11th Light Horse regiments during the First World War.





During the morning Leon stated he was contacting the ABC and providing comment on our ceremony which he did at the time. He also chased up a number of different people including myself, Maurie Burke, chair of the Cradock Heritage Group and Justin Brown, retired Army veteran of the Combat Engineers who officiated during the main ceremony. He sourced the background of the community and especially the background of our Memorial Garden and War Memorial. He put together an entry on Facebook during which he stated, the "Cradock Anzac Day dawn ceremony was one of the best, this tiny

town, with a massive heart and community spirit, puts on one of the best ANZAC Day Dawn Services in Australia."

His comments have been widely circulated since the Anzac ceremony. If you chase up his name on Facebook you'll see his entry, in addition to his spiel on the day etc, there are also 75 photos which he took during the day.

University of Adelaide Students at Pichi Richi

You MAY WELL have seen hoards of students in high viz tops over Easter around Pichi Richi. In fact, you may well have passed similar groups any year over the last sixty years doing very similar things as this year was the sixty first consecutive year where students from The University of Adelaide have spent a week in the region training to be earth scientists.

The students turn up fresh faced and a little sad at having to give up their holiday for an intensive week learning how to the read the rocks, how to collect orientation data from the rock outcrops and how to tell the stories of the deep past from the rocks in the pass.

Pichi Richi Pass is one of the best places in the country to train students in this as it contains a wonderful array of sedimentary rocks—those are rocks that were deposited as sand or muds on the surface of the earth by rivers and tides.

Within them they preserve evidence of what this part of the world was like 600 million years ago. That is long before the dinosaurs roamed the continent, in fact even before animals had evolved and before the amazing impressions that you can see in the rocks in the new Nilpena National Park evolved. It is an incredible part of the world and one that has inspired generations of earth scientists and where generations of students have realised that earth science and geology is what they want to do with their lives—including a number of students from Quorn over the years!

I'm a professor at The University of Adelaide and ran the trip for a decade in the 2000's. Now my colleague A/Prof Ros King leads the trip, but the wonderful area got into my bones and my wife and I now own one of the properties in the pass, so we have joined the generous land owners who make this trip possible every year and help the next generation of earth scientists learn about this amazing planet of ours. Next time you see students in the pass, stop and talk to them about what they are doing... there are some amazing stories about our planet preserved in those rocks!


Quorn: Our 145th Birthday


Then we celebrated our Centenary in 1978. And the history of Quorn was



Proposal to Revoke Community Land Classification

of Land

Council is seeking community feedback on a proposal to revoke the classification of "community land" for identified parcels of land.

Council has re-evaluated the need for 20 parcels of "community land" and has deemed them to be surplus to the Council's needs. Historically, these allotments have either been inadvertently categorised as community land or are no longer deemed required for a community purpose. It is Councils intention to include this land in a divestment strategy to enable the parcels to be sold at a future date. However, to do this, the land status as community land must be revoked under the *Local Government Act 1999* (the Act).

The allotments identified, by and large, are redundant, not used by the community, and cost the Council money to maintain and upkeep. It is considered that the value held in these properties may better be realised if they were sold (either now or in future), with the funds to be redistributed into other community assets and infrastructure

For the Council to revoke the community land classification of the properties it is necessary to undertake a process prescribed under section 194 of the Act. The first step was to prepare a Report for Council to adopt. This Report (Proposal to Revoke Community Land Classification of Land) addresses the criteria prescribed by section 194(2) of the Act and was adopted by Council at the Ordinary Meeting of 16 August 2022.

This Report contains:

- a summary of the reasons for the proposal; and
- a statement of any dedication, reservation or trust to which the land is subject; and
- a statement of whether revocation of the classification is proposed with a view to sale or disposal of the land and, if so, details of any Government assistance given to acquire the land and a statement of how the council proposes to use the proceeds; and
- an assessment of how implementation of the proposal would affect the area and the local community; and
- if the Council is not the owner of the land—a statement of any requirements made by the owner of the land as a condition of approving the proposed revocation of the classification; and
- details of all parcels of land.

This Report is now out for this report out for community consultation. A copy of this report is available from <u>www.frc.sa.gov.au/community/latest-news</u> or in hard copy from the Quorn Administration Office or Teagues Motors, Hawker.

Council is now seeking written submissions on this Report. Once received the submissions will be collated and considered by Council at a future Ordinary Meeting and submitted to the Minister as part of the application process seeking Ministerial endorsement of the proposal.

The power to resolve and revoke the community land classification of land is only available after the Minister has approved the proposed revocation.

Railways: A Wondrous Journey

VISIT THE PICHI Richi Railway and experience the Great Northern Railway that was built from Port Augusta to Quorn in 1879, to serve mining and pastoral enterprises in the far north of the colony. The new transportation system meant a passenger could reach their destination at a cracking pace of 15 mph and the vast outback was within everyone's scope. Learn about communication through the Overland Telegraph with relays at railway stations, the mail train and the social benefits of travel, employment, and entertainment of international standard with celebrated acts such as the *Marvellous Corricks*.

Communication

During the 19th and early 20th centuries, railways provided a fast and reliable means of carrying the mail. The opening of a new line usually meant transferring the carriage of mail to rail, instead of by coach or ship, to ensure the mail arrived sooner and at more predictable times.

The rail link allowed mail to be carried between cities and townships in a day, compared to a week-long journey by coach in earlier years. Also, railways offered greater security against robbery, particularly for registered mail (which usually contained valuables), compared to coach journeys.

The importance of railways to postal services was reflected in a common practice of locating post offices at railway stations in smaller towns. The duties of stationmaster and postmaster were often combined to facilitate the handling of mail. The General Post Offices of capital cities were located near the railway stations for more efficient mail handling.

A special feature of "mail by rail" was the Travelling Post Office (TPO). TPO services comprised dedicated railway carriages specially outfitted for mail to be sorted and

postmarked during the journey. Most TPOs were phased out by World War II, although some that linked isolated areas continued operating until more recent years.

The Trans-Australian Railway operated a "pay train", which commenced service in 1915 (during construction of the railway), and continued operating until 1986. The pay train provided stamp sales, money orders and banking facilities for railway employees working along the line. The actual post office was situated in the middle of one carriage, with a public area of about two metres long and one metre wide, and a foothold to reach the counter when the pay train was not operating at a station.

Railways were important for carrying domestic mail, but they also provided the vital link for overseas mail. Until 1917, Adelaide was the "first and last" port-of-call for most of Australia's overseas shipping links. From Adelaide, passengers, freight and mail could be transported more quickly by rail to Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and elsewhere in eastern Australia. The Adelaide-Melbourne express train provided the key for the efficient handling of the inwards and outwards overseas mail. On some occasions, it was even necessary to arrange dedicated trains solely to carry the mail between Melbourne and Adelaide.

With the opening of the Trans-Australian Railway in 1917, Fremantle replaced Adelaide as the "first and last" port-of-call and, as a result, reduced the time required to transmit overseas mail within Australia. The "mail by rail" era came to an end in the mid-1980s. The carriage of non-standard letters and parcels by railways was replaced by a fleet of trucks acquired by Australia Post to carry this mail between capital cities and regional centres. However, "mail by rail" has returned in recent years. As part of Australia Post's commitment to continuously improving environmental efficiencies, the corporation returned to using rail to carry mail between Adelaide and Perth. This has reduced its total annual greenhouse emissions by 2.5 per cent https://australiapostcollectables.com.au/ articles/mail-by-rail

Stagecoach

The only means of transportation prior to the railways was Stagecoach. A long journey which required changing horses, a few rest stops.

To the north of the city the longest route went to Yudnamatana, via Kapunda, Melrose and Nuccaleena, from whence a packhorse completed the final 100 miles of a 400 miles journey.

It was no light responsibility to be the driver of a team of six or eight horses attached to a crowded coach through the Adelaide hills and across the sprawling plains of the north.







Recommissioning of NM25

ON SATURDAY April 26th the

recommissioning of steam locomotive NM25 took place at Quorn Railway Station. Official guests included the SA Minister for Tourism, the Hon. Jane Lomax-Smith and Port

Augusta Mayor, Joy Baluch. The ceremony was to have taken place in Port Augusta, but during tests on Friday 25th April the NM25 developed a fault.

Frantic efforts

Despite frantic efforts of Pichi Richi Railway members most of Friday night to correct the fault, the locomotive was unable to make the journey to Port Augusta.

Phones ran hot and an alternative plan developed.

Even though time schedules changed dramatically, participants agreed it was a successful day. Minister Lomax-Smith was extremely impressed with the work of all concerned and the volunteers of the PRRPS.

Working life

Commenting on the days events, John Evans of the SA Tourism Commission pointed out that as NM25 spent its working life operating out of and being serviced at Quorn, it was not inappropriate that its recommissioning took place here. In a few weeks, after the fault has been rectified, NM25 will take its place in Pichi Richi fleet regularly hauling the Afghan Express between Port Augusta and Quorn.
