Chief Officers Unit Citation for Service Award

ON THE 1ST of March 2023 at around 07:30hrs, the Lincoln Gap Composite Crew were just about to complete their long night shift at the Lincoln Gap tyre fire when they were alerted to a 2-car head on collision approx. 1km west of their location on the Lincoln Highway.

The Lincoln Gap Composite Crew quickly made their way to the scene and when arriving only minutes later were confronted with a horrific and extremely traumatic scene. Debris was scattered across the highway, 3 x victims heavily trapped within the 2 x vehicles with 2 of the victims showing limited signs of life.

Without hesitating, The Lincoln Gap Composite Crew triaged the most urgent of victims and quickly got to work on performing CPR, opening victims airways, and providing whatever first aid they could until the ambulance service arrived.

The Lincoln Gap Composite Crew was the only emergency crew on scene for approx. 15-20 minutes. During this time, the victims appeared to remain stable, however, unfortunately, the 2 x drivers were unable to be stabilised and revived by the ambulance crews once they arrived on scene.

Due to the quick thinking and initiative of The Lincoln Gap Composite Crew, the passenger of one of the vehicles was able to be saved and then later airlifted to hospital.

After the fatigue experienced of working a long night shift on a complex tyre fire, and then being alerted and responding to a serious vehicle accident only 1km away, shows that the dedication and professionalism of the crew to be able to quickly re focus, calmly assess the new situation and manage such a complex scene was above and beyond the expectations of these crews on this day. Both crews placed themselves within this horrific scene in attempt to save these victims lives without any hesitation or thoughts about how this scene might affect themselves.

The Lincoln Gap Composite Crew, and the ambulance service crew, on this day performed above and beyond what is reasonably expected of our volunteers, and they should be commended for their work and dedication to the South Australian Community.



AUNTIE BETTY WAS born and grew up in Port Lincoln. She attended college in Western Australia and after graduating she moved to Sydney working for her church. She then moved back to Adelaide in about 1963. It was at this time she met Uncle John. They were married in Port Lincoln in 1966 and she moved to Quorn were she firstly worked for Con Saras in his grocery shop on First Street. When the grocery shop closed she then went to work in the office of QMB run by Pat Smith at the time.

Uncle John was born in the old Quorn Hospital of the corner of First and Fourth Street. As a young child he lived at the rail sidings of Hughes, Parachilna and finally at Willochra. This is where he went to school. He started working at the tender age of 13 after the Willochra school closed. He started in the shearing sheds locally, as well as working for Eric Hilder and his Great Uncle Dave Stokes. He then did National Service in the Army and although hating school he revelled in the Army life. After his discharge from National Service he returned to shearing and working for Bill and Edna Francis and it was about this time he started to buy his farm on the Willochra plains.

It was about this time he met and finally married Auntie Betty. They eventually sold the farm in the 1990s and decided to caravan Australia, some times solo, other times with friends or family, doing this until Uncle John was in his early 80s and could not set up the caravan properly.

Their latter years, as they progressed into their 80s, became a struggle with health. Auntie Betty was diagnosed with cancer and the onset of dementia, Uncle John's focus was now devoted to looking after his wife of 50 odd years. At the end he was not looking after himself as well as he should, and they both ended up in the Quorn Hospital with a view to moving into Flinders House.

This was not to be, as a few months prior, Auntie Betty's cancer diagnosis was not promising and she passed quietly on the 19th of April. This rocked Uncle John severely and on the 8th of May just 19 days later he also passed.

I would like to express the family's gratitude to all of the Staff at the Quorn Hospital for their dedication and loving way that they cared for our Uncle and Auntie while they were staying at the Quorn Hospital. Also a big thanks to Kylie Finlay for her loving support and help over the years. Thankyou all from the bottom of our hearts.

"LOOK FOR THAT COLOUR RUN "is a fundraising event for Mental Health.

Organised by Daniel Turk and a couple of his mates as his support team, it will coincide the with the Pichi Richi Marathon 25th June 2023.

He will start off running from the water tanks on the Whyalla/Port Augusta Road; his intention is to meet up with the Pichi Richi Marathon runners as they start out from the Standpipe Port Augusta. When marathon runners finish at Quorn he will continue his run to Warren Gorge and back making his length ran 100 kilometres for the day.

Daniel has throughout his life suffered from anxiety and depression and found that running is his best medicine along with knowing to say "no I am not okay" reaching out for help and advocates for others to speak up about how they are feeling and their mates/family listen.

He has recently been inspired by his uncle who is in his mid-late fifties when he completed a 100-kilometre run through the Blue Mountains in October last year. Daniel then set himself up to do that distance. If his ageing uncle could do it, he surely could.

Then he saw it as an opportunity to bring the mental health conversations to the forefront and while he was at it, he could help an organisation that focuses on helping fellow sufferers by raising some funds. Daniel invites anyone to join him in the run especially in the last 40 kilometres when he knows he will be feeling the toll.

Daniel and his support team have set up a Look for That Colour Run Go Fund Me Page, which provides people an opportunity to support him by donating to Mindful Aus.

Why Mindfull Aus?

The organisation Mindfull Aus resonates with him as they work with blue collar workers, sporting clubs, youth, and the regional and remote communities to "start the conversation".

Daniel has so far raised \$4000 well on his way to raise the target of \$15000.




'THE MERGER'

Colebrook Home

IN 1924 MISS ANNE LOCKE of the United Aborigines Mission travelled north from Adelaide to Oodnadatta where she opened the first U.A.M operations in South Australia. In 1925 she was joined by Miss Iris Harris (later Mrs Wade), and in 1926 Miss Ruby Hyde was sent to Oodnadatta to replace Miss Locke. These three women pioneered what was later to become known as Colebrook Home.

By 1926 when Miss Hyde arrived in Oodnadatta, there were five children resident at the mission home. The government policy at the time was for the removal of half-caste children from their traditional cultural and family ties and for the mission to play an active role in assimilating the children into white society.

In time the missionaries felt that housing these children at Oodnadatta was unsatisfactory so the U.A.M. began to search for a house further south. In May 1927 they purchased a small house on the outskirts of Quorn for \$5000. (This was at the corner of Pearce Road and Flower Road near Stony Creek railway bridge). As soon as the house was purchased, Miss Hyde left Oodnadatta with twelve children and travelled south to establish the first official Colebrook Home, named after T.E.Colebrook, the Australian President of the U.A.M.



First Colebrook Home

Miss Hyde was not long at the home before she was joined by Miss Delia Rutter. This marked the beginning of a lifetime commitment by Sisters Hyde and Rutter to Colebrook Home and the many Aboriginal children who came under their care. The unique and wholeheartedly dedication of these two missionaries ensured that Colebrook was more like a large family than an institution.

Colebrook Home remained at the first house in Quorn for six years by which time conditions had become quite overcrowded and the house riddled with white ants. A new house was urgently needed and, despite efforts to move the house closer to Adelaide, a second home was purchased not far out of Quorn on the Hawker Road. By mid 1933, the sisters and the children had moved to this other home, and thus the second Colebrook Home in Quorn. The home was in this location until Christmas 1943 when the sisters brought the children to Adelaide, initially for a holiday, but then established the third Colebrook Home at Eden Hills.

The third home at Eden Hills was renamed Colebrook Training Home. The Sisters stayed at the home until 1952 when they left and established Stanford St. Parkside, then the Tanderra Girls Home in Torrensville, Adelaide.

Many of those who grew up in the Colebrook Homes look fondly upon the early days, when the Home was located at Quorn. It is this period of its history when a unique and special Colebrook identity was forged, which is commemorated by those who grew up there.

Times were not always easy in the home. Many children felt a great sadness at being separated from their families and culture. In the early days, the sisters had difficulty in securing a safe and reliable water supply. Being a faith mission, the sisters and the children relied on their own limited resources and the generosity of others. Those brought up in the home remember vividly praying for food and other needs. The government provided little support for the Home initially and at times actively hindered its operations.

Despite these difficulties the Home continued. The love and devotion and sheer hard work of Sisters Hyde and Rutter made sure of this. The children were provided with uniforms of maroon and white, which Sister Hyde sewed herself. Every effort was made by the sisters to ensure that the children participated in all aspects of Quorn life. The children went to the local school and to local churches.

The original Quorn 'family' is proud of its tradition. The first Aboriginal nurse in S.A. was

from the home. This encouraged the other girls to train as nurses. The home has also produced school teachers, kindergarten director, social workers, welfare and liaison officers, administrators, actors, Justice of the Peace, missionaries, musicians, artists, tradesmen and international and state sports persons.

Although exempt from the armed forces, seven boys and one girl enlisted during the Second World War. In 1985, a Colebrook Home woman was awarded the honour of 'Australian of The Year'.

After Colebrook closed in 1981, former residents formed the Colebrook Tji Tji Tjuta organisation in order to preserve available records of children who had passed through the home. A memorial park now stands on the former site at Eden Hills. A statue of a grieving mother is a reminder of the many mothers whose children grew up without them.

Those who grew up in Colebrook Home are proud to be Aboriginal and proud to be Colebrooks.

The Colebrook family revolved around the unselfish devotion of two remarkable ladies, Sister R.M.Hyde M.B.E. and Sister D.Rutter M.B.E. Their M.B.E.s were awarded in recognition of their dedication and service. Sister Rutter died in 1973 aged 82 years and Sister died in 1982 aged 90 years. The Colebrook family pay homage to them and to our brothers and sisters who have passed on.
