


















# Education in the Quorn area Part 2

**The Dyke (Partacoona)** was a small school with student numbers from 19 in 1882 to 6 in 1884. During this time parents paid school fees of 5 hundred and 25 pounds, 19 shillings and 6 pence.

#### Mrs Clark's Ladies School Quorn

A Miss Halworth Clark commenced a Ladies' School in Quorn. Site is unknown. Terms were available on application. There is little known of this school.

Gordon had a wood and iron building erected behind the store which was owned by the Misses Pearce. This building was also used as a Community Centre for church, school and social events. Two years later as a Public School, a weatherboard building, with teacher's accommodation attached, was built. A grant was given to the school committee to erect a shelter shed. This school remained a Public School till 1888 when it was reclassified in 1889 as a Provisional School.

Mt Brown School was located upstream from the Mt Brown Hotel. This was another school which shifted as the school population altered. Within 2 years of it opening (1905), there were 50 students. This being a testament to the population shift. As the numbers declined by leaving school or to attend High School, the remaining students went to Bruce School or did correspondence lessons. This first building was demolished and the gum trees planted at the school are still visible today.

In 1939 when a need for a school in the Mt Brown Creek area arose, the Education Department provided a transportable wood and iron building and 2 acres of land was given by a Mr Twopenny on 'The Gunyah' property. This was located about 10 miles from Wilmington. The parents built straw stables which won a Government Shield for being best kept. A tennis court was laid by a Mr Keith Fraser using only a shovel. This too was a school that moved. As the student numbers declined to 5, the school was moved 2 ½ miles closer to Wilmington to Red Hill Corner. A year later the school was moved to Wilmington Primary School.

**Hundred of Palmer School** was built of pug and stone on the property of a Mr G Burgess. One day the teacher became ill, sent the

children home, and this school was never to open again. In 1912 another school was built 9km east of the town of Stephenston.

**Stephenston School** grew from a demand for a flourishing township. This school and the one at Palmer shared a teacher (half-time schools). This school opened in the church building. Originally the building was erected as a store by Cottrell & Fyfe. When these people left the town, the building was purchased by the Methodist Church and used as a school.

The town of Stephenston ceased to exist in 1961 and the cemetery is all that is visible today. The former town became part of the Carling property.

**Pichi Richi** School located in Yarrah Vale was classified as a Special Provisional School. In 1916 it was a half-time school with Arden Vale School. Fluctuating student numbers caused this school to close and reopen, eventually closing in 1940. The building was demolished in 1943.

Richman Creek School is believed to have been conducted at the home of a Mr Hobbs who lived on Section 557 Hd Willochra. This was on the south side of Burnt Down Creek near the Quorn -Wilmington Road. A few remains of the house may still be seen today. The church building was later used as a school as well as a church. In 1880, the Education Department rented this building at \$24 (equivalent), and opened a Provisional School. In 1890, this school had a name change to Itali Itali. This was to stop confusion with Richman Valley School. The new name was taken from the station owned by H J Richman in the pastoral days.

There were 27 students enrolled in 1883, increasing to 42 in 1892. After the turn of the century, enrolment dropped as families left the district. This school went half-time with Bruce in 1908-09. In 1917 the school went half-time with Richman Valley.

In 1936, a 'Back to School' was held with 20 old scholars attending, as well as local families and visitors from Quorn.

During the War years, once a month on Sale Days, mothers baked pasties which the children sold for 4 pence each to stock-buyers travelling by road to Quorn. Funds raised went to the School's Patriotic Fund.

(The students raised money for the war and the school purchased wool etc. so they, and their mothers' could knit scarves, beanies, gloves etc. for the soldiers at war. The students also received badges for their effort of collecting trash eg papers, aluminium, copper etc. The monies from these collections also went into the fund.)

In drought years a great pastime of the children at dinnertime was catching rabbits in the paddock across the road from the school. Firstly, they would fill in all visible burrows with sticks and stones, then run around and flush out a rabbit. Rabbits were so poor the children could outrun them and catch them quite easily.

A passing car caused excitement one day when its gas-producer started a grass fire at the edge of the road by the school.

The school closed in 1945, the church closed in 1952 and the building was demolished. A memorial cairn was erected on the site in 1969.

**Richman Valley School (renamed Woolundunga)** Little is known and recorded of this school. It first opened in rented premises with an average daily attendance of 17. These figures remained for 3 years when the school was renamed and the daily figures

were 27. In 1901 the school reverted back to its original name, and in 1905 permission was granted for the school to be used by the Church of England. Like many small district schools, children from Quorn were sometimes boarded by the local farmers and sent to the school in order to keep them open.

Round Hill School when first opened had an enrolment of 29. It was an old stone building on the property of a Mr L. Jones. In 1882, a grant was approved for a new school and residence to be built. This was a weatherboard building. The old stone building was demolished and the stone carted to Quorn, and used in the erection of a house in First Street. The school closed in 1905 due to adverse seasons which caused the abandonment of farms in the area.


Willochra School was held in the church building. It was a wood and iron construction and the Education Department rented it. The only other building was a General Store which was finally used by the Methodist Church. Willochra township was surveyed adjacent to Ragless Hotel and was an overnight halt on the old coach route from Kapunda to Blinman.

Wilson was opened in the Wesleyan Church building which was a weatherboard building with an iron roof and measuring only 24 feet by 16 feet (c 7m x 5m). There were 14 students when opened and it's highest enrolment was 52. Two years later (1884), a stone building with residence attached was erected. Fluctuation in the seasons affected the school's numbers, as was the norm back in those years. In good years boys over 7 years of age were kept at home to help on the farms. During drought years, as farm chores decreased, the



Wyacca School became a Provisional School in 1892. Prior to this, the first settlers taught their children at home. School was held in an old farmhouse originally owned by a Mr Bill Miller who sold it to a Mr Hannerman. The school soon became a Public School and the building was rented by the Education Department. There were 21 children enrolled. In 1907 a new school was built on 2 acres of land donated by Mr Hannerman. The old school building was demolished and stone from that was used in the building of the new school. This was then doubled as a church and school. A Mr Schumann agreed to build it. To raise money, a Mr Pearce canvassed the district in an old spring dray. He also wrote to firms in Adelaide for donations. D Shearer & Sons gave 2 dozen ploughshares. When the school closed in 1919, a total of 112 students had attended the school.

# The Rocky Break in Australia

A FEW KILOMETRES east of Stirling North, as the Flinders Ranges Way rises up into the first hills before Saltia, the view back west towards the Eyre Peninsula might not look too impressive today, but it looks over the most fundamental geological boundary in Australia.

Here, in the Flinders Ranges, we stand on rocks that were once beach sands and marine muds. Eight hundred million years ago these were deposited on the tropical margin of the then brand-new Pacific Ocean. As you look over Port Augusta to the distant Eyre Peninsula you are looking towards truly ancient Australia. From Port Augusta, west, right through to Perth, rocks beneath your feet date back more than a billion years old. This is the true core of the country. Eight hundred million years ago, it would have been the east coast of Australia.

The boundary between these ancient rocks and the Flinders Ranges is a boundary known to geologists as the Torrens Hinge Zone and it marks a great split where over 800 million years ago a great continent called Rodinia was pulled apart by plate tectonic forces. As it stretched, Australia freed itself from North America and the ancestral Pacific Ocean was born. Rodinia was no more. A great rift valley formed and flooded and the rocks of the Flinders Ranges were deposited.

To the east, the same rocks today form the flat top hills north and west of Port Augusta, but these simply make a thin veneer over the really ancient crystalline rocks that date back to the early history of the Earth. In fact, just to the west of ranges that make up the far distant hills in the photo above, are the oldest rocks in South Australia—the 3,400,000,000 year old Cooyerdoo Granite found between Iron Knob and Iron Baron.







### **50 Years of PRRPS**

The Pichi Richi Railway Preservation Society Inc, was born 50 years ago, but what happened next after that important meeting in Pt Augusta on July 22nd 1973? The tasks were to save the dry stone walls, review, repair and rebuild the narrow gauge (3 foot, 6 inch) railway track (originally built in the 1880s) and ensure all the bridges through the Pass were operational.

This mammoth task, done by volunteers using rudimentary equipment and many hours of hard work, also coincided with the restoration of Steam Locomotive W934. Equally, a huge effort in carriage renovation work and a ticketing system, to become a functioning tourist railway on 20th July, 1974.




