All five Trails cleared and signposted 1–4 offer spectacular Summit Views

1. The Dutchman's Stern Park

Drive 8.5 km via Arden Vale Rd from Quorn to Car Park

- 10.6 km circuit (easier clockwise) or
- 8.4 km return via Terrace/Northern Trail or
- 6 km return to Stony Creek Lookout or
- 5 km return to Terrace Lookout

2. Warren Gorge

Drive 22 km via Arden Vale Rd from Quorn to Trailhead 5.2 km circuit (easier clockwise)

The Naming of the GHAN

100th Anniversary

OPENED IN 1879, the railway through the Pichi Richi Pass was the first section of what became the Central Australian Railway to Alice Springs. It was also the first section of the Great Northern Railway which was intended for Palmerston (in Darwin).

Before the railway was built, the only method of transport to the interior of Australia was by horse and dray, or by camel trains. Trains hauled passengers, coal, troops, livestock, minerals and agricultural products between Port Augusta, Quorn and beyond for nearly 70 years.

The Ghan is one the oldest named trains in Australia, and possibly the most famous and Wednesday, August 30, 2023 marked the 100th anniversary of the naming of The Ghan.

There is general agreement the GHAN name is derived from Afghan and the Afghan Cameleers who once provided transport to the outback.

Prior to August 1923 the South Australian Railways, the operator of the train, took 3 days to make the train journey from Adelaide to the end of the line, Oodnadatta, and enroute passengers had to stay overnight in hotels at Quorn and Marree.

On 30th August 1923, a significant event occurred in Quorn, in the Flinders Ranges, when the Oodnadatta train, still operated by the South Australian Railways, arrived in Quorn from Terowie. This train had a sleeping car attached with the aim of reducing the travel time by removing the 2 overnight layovers.

This innovation of the American Commissioner of the South Australian Railways, W.A. Webb. was quite an event for the railway workers at Quorn and for those who travelled the line and there was quite a gathering of spectators interested in seeing who was travelling aboard the sleeping car.

When the train arrived in Quorn only one passenger alighted from the sleeping car, an Afghan cameleer who was carrying his prayer mat and heading to a quiet corner of the Quorn station yard to say his evening prayers. Amongst the onlookers was Ernie Smith, a

locomotive driver and proud unionist. Smith commented "Struth! If that is all that is coming aboard, we'll have to call it the Afghan Express."

That name, the "Afghan Express" travelled north with that first train. Pichi Richi Railway's first Honorary Life Member, the late Alfred George Williams, as a young man, was employed as the assistant to the pumper at Oodnadatta and he heard the name coined by the engine crew when it arrived the following day.

From that day on, the railwaymen who operated the fortnightly passenger train to Oodnadatta and later to Alice Springs, when the line was extended there in 1929, referred to it as the "Afghan Express". Over the years they abbreviated it to the "Ghan Express" and later to just the "Ghan" as it is now known.

This naming occurred whilst Oodnadatta was still the railhead of the Great Northern Railway.

That AFGHAN EXPRESS train is now named "The GHAN" and has gone on to become one of the world's great train journeys! Journey Beyond Rail now operates The Ghan and Pichi Richi Railway runs the Afghan Express service on that section of the original Ghan line.

In Pichi Richi Railways, locomotive and carriage collection, is that same sleeping car which the Afghan gentleman rode, SAR Sleeping Car "Alberga".

Education in the Quorn Area part 3

St Joseph's Convent Quorn. The education of the Catholic community was well catered for from 1890 until the Convent School closed on December 12th 1958, having been operated by the Sisters of St Joseph.

The first Superior to take charge was Sister Placida, with Sisters Catherine, Anne and Ita. The numbers of children were not recorded during the first two years, but in 1893, five Sisters had charge of 87 children, and in 1910 the highest enrolment was recorded, being 110. After an additional building to the convent was erected in 1914, boarders were taken in, as many as eight being boarded during 1928-32, with six Sisters in residence.

In the early years, school was taught in the two back rooms of the church, until the opening of the new St Joseph's School Hall in 1923 by Msgr. Mulcahy. The foundation stone having been laid on September 3rd 1922.

Following the closure of the convent, for several years the sisters of the Motor Mission visited schools and homes to give Religious Instruction to Catholic children.

Many Quorn children of other denominations owe much to the Sisters of St Joseph, for providing a valuable service with their skilled teaching of music, the loss of which was greatly felt when the convent closed.

Quorn Primary School was opened in 1879 as a Provisional School in charge of Mr William James George, with an average daily attendance of 36 children.

By 1881 the enrolments had increased and the daily average attendance numbered 73, taking the school out of the Provisional classification to that of Public School.

In 1883 the total enrolments were 226 with the daily average of 91. Mr P.F.Wholohan was

appointed in 1883, remaining at the school until the end of 1888. The daily average attendances for these years were from 91 to 141.6.

In 1892, the staff was increased to two teachers, the average daily attendance being 149.9. A further increase in staff occurred in 1895, when the daily average attendance rose to 237. In 1905 the staff was again increased by one, totaling four teachers with an average daily attendance of 203.8. With such large numbers of children, it is interesting to note that from 1882 to 1904 the lowest percentage of passes was 74%, the highest being 88%, with the percentage being in the 80% for thirteen years.

The Inspector's report for July 1907, made a special mention of the singing and the start made by the drum and fife band. The head teacher responsible for the formation of the band was Mr John C. Nadebaum. The band was also commended by the Director of Education, Mr A. Williams.

The school band took part in most school functions as well as the daily assemblies. On the occasions of the annual picnics at the beach at Port Augusta, the band led the students from the railway station to the beach, as well as from the school to the Quorn Railway Station, for the train journey.

As well as the "Three R's" and conventional subjects, sport played a big part in school life. Regular sports days were held, with interhouse matches and competition against neighboring schools.

In 1928 classes of woodwork and experimental agriculture were added to the curriculum, both subjects being reported by the School Inspector as being most favorable.

The stone building with the teacher's residence attached, was built of stone quarried in the district. In 1926 the building was remodeled to supply additional classrooms. The school functioned as a Primary School in 1968 when, with the High School, it became the Quorn Area School.

In 1967, when the High School numbers were at an unacceptably low level, the Education Department formulated plans to create an Area School. For space reasons, it was decided that the Area School would be established in the grounds of the High School.

The building was used by the Area School until June 25th 1969 when the Samcon buildings at the rear of the High School were completed, and the primary school students moved to this new location.

The residence is retained by the Education Department for use by staff.

A new Headmaster's residence was built in 1971, opposite the old school on the corner of Second and Seventh Streets.

The Quorn Primary School has since had a new lease of life. The original northern section has become the Quorn Kindergarten, and the southern section has become the Quorn Outdoor Education Centre. During 1977, the Area School assumed control of Q.O.E.C. when it became apparent a coordinator would be necessary to monitor the centre. The last headmaster of the Primary School was Mr D.C. Chambers.

Quorn High School played a big part in the education of the youth of the northern part of the State. Prior to 1909 students who had successfully completed their primary schooling, were able to continue their education within the Primary School. In 1909 the number of

secondary students made it necessary for some alteration to this scheme. To enable the successful operation of the secondary section of the school to be undertaken, a substantial building on Railway Terrace was rented by the Education Department, and the secondary students transferred there. Until 1913 the secondary section was worked as an adjunct to the Primary School. This building is the present Masonic Hall.

In 1914 it was officially declared a High School, the first in the northern area. Mr. Sydney Mills was appointed as Headmaster, the average daily attendance being 18.4. The enrolments steadily increased until by 1921 the average had reached 40.8. The townspeople of Quorn, aware of the value of secondary

education for their children, expressed their concern at the inadequacy of the premises as a school. The Mayor Mr. Robert Thompson, called a meeting of townspeople to decide on the future of the Quorn High School.

The people of Quorn, led by the Mayor, raised sufficient funds, subsidised by the Government to build the present buildings on West Terrace. The money raised was subsequently remitted by the Government to the Council of the High School for amenities. Five acres of land on which the school was built, was given by the Town Council.

In 1935 the first Twopenny Scholarship was awarded to Dorothy Altmann. This Scholarship funded by the late Mr. E.N. Twopenny was awarded to the fourth year student who had gained the highest marks in the third year examinations, and was continuing their education at Quorn High School. Mr Twopenny, who died in 1977, made provision in his Will for a Trust Fund for the perpetuation of the Scholarship.

In sport, inter-house matches were played regularly -cricket and tennis in the summer, football and netball in the winter. Inter-school matches were also played in which visits to Port Augusta and Booleroo Centre High Schools were inter-changed. There were also inter-town sports – Alice Springs, Woomera being two towns.

When the Quorn Basketball (now Netball) Association was formed in 1940, the school entered two teams.'

Prior to 1968, the students taking commercial subjects produced a small paper called "Quorn News". The students reported on local events, typed the stencils and duplicated the material. The paper was most popular with Quorn people. Publication of this paper ceased in 1973, but recommenced in 1985. The last headmaster of the school was Mr R.J.Marshall. *Quorn Area School.* In 1967, it was evident

that Quorn had the smallest High School enrolment in the State, and the inevitable decision was taken to amalgamate the two schools in the left into the Quorn Area School.

This was done with little pomp and celebration. As soon as the new facilities at the High School were completed, the students from the Primary School moved over in June 1969. At this time there was a secondary enrolment of 52 and staff of 6. By contrast, there were 6 Primary teachers for 217 students enrolled. There was no ancillary staff, not even clerical, but by 1988, with a school population of 250, there were 22 teachers and ancillary of 8

The Prefect System existed until 1970 when it was changed to Student Council. From 1928 – 1967, the High School had three sports 'houses' -Arden, Richman and Flinders. In 1967 this changed to two 'houses' – Kanyaka and Yarrah. This stayed till 1977 when the system reverted back to the three houses.

Being an Area School, provided the town with an adequate library. This facility is welcomed by all members of the local community all year round.

With the rapid expansion of technology, the school has gone from 'slate to silicon chip' in the hundred plus years that education has been in the area.

Devastation hit the school in 1987 when a ferocious fire ripped through the Administration /library building. 10,000 library books, shelving furniture, office machinery was salvaged and saved by the community help. Over 700 man hours by the community saw the demolition of the burnt building and the cleanup of the aftermath. New buildings of a classroom block and gymnasium were undertaken along with the conversion of the original stone building to administration / Library complex.

Education in Quorn has always been broad based, and has included electives as camps, excursions, music, debating, animal husbandry and sport. Some activities and sport have depended on staff members being experienced in those fields.

Since 1986 a program of exchange for both teachers and students has been encouraged. Student from across the globe have been welcomed to experience Quorn and surrounds.

Many things have changed over the years, but never the co-operative spirit which has always been evident between staff, students and parents. May this long continue.

Recipe

Apple and Cinnamon Cake

125g soft Butter

1 cup Sugar

2 Eggs

1 tsp Vanilla Essence

1/2 cup Milk

1 1/4cups Flour

1 1/2 tsp Baking Powder

2 Apples

Place all ingredients, except apples, into a mixing bowl and beat for approx. 3 minutes till mixture is pale in color. Pour into a greased 20 x 30 sponge roll tin. Cut apples in half, core, then slice each half into about 10 slices. Place in layer on top of mixture. Sprinkle with topping consisting of 1/4 cup Brown Sugar and 1 tsp ground Cinnamon.

Bake at 180 deg for about 30 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched.





To Make Walking Easier



SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S National Parks boasts that its Walking Trails are designed for all ages. But in fact they're made only for the young and fit.

Our two Conservation Parks Trails are 15km on Mt Brown and 10.6 km on The Dutchman's Stern. Hardly designed for walkers in their mid-50s or their 60s, 70s, 80s, or 90s—are they!

Of course you don't have to walk *all* the way around them. In fact, if you walk to the summits up and back just the Western Trail on Mt Brown, that's 12 km instead. And just the Terrace Trail on The Dutchman's Stern is 8.4km. But that's still too far unless you're young *and* fit.

It's odd that most older and less fit would-be walkers don't even think of going only *part* of the way and simply turning back. However, many of them might walk part-way if there were a good viewpoint to aim at a short way up. But Parks don't offer enticements such as that.

Finding Answers

OLDER OR LESS fit walkers often ask how long a trail is, and say that 5 km is the most they'll walk. So the answer's obvious. Find a viewpoint about 2.5 km up a Trail, and *put a seat there!*


The seat's necessary. If you're 80 or 90 years old, sitting on the ground for a rest is a problem. Hard to get up again! A simple seat solves this.

So that's what our *Walking Trails Support Group* have done. The small pic shows the kind of seats they install. But *many* walkers say how wonderful it is to find these seats to rest on!

The top pic shows the just installed seat at Terrace Viewpoint. This is 2.5km up the Terrace Trail on The Dutchman's Stern. The bottom pic is of the much older seat at Bald Hill Viewpoint 2.7km up the Western Trail on Mt Brown.

On The Dutchman we also have the Stony Creek Viewpoint Seat 3km up the Valley Trail, a Summit Viewpoint seat at 4·2km, and we'll soon have one for the oldest walkers merely 60 metres up from the Car Park. So, we'll then have 'seats & viewpoints' for walkers of all ages!





News from the SA Arid Lands Landscape Board

SOUTHERN RANGELANDS GRAZING LAND MANAGEMENT WORKSHOP

Quorn's Southern Rangelands Grazing Land Management workshop was well attended on Thursday 24 August. Twenty one people received training designed specifically for the region by Meat & Livestock Australia's (MLA) EDGE network. Delivered by experts Dionne Walsh from Range IQ, Deb Scammell from Talking Livestock and Tanisha Shields from Agrista, the workshops delivered the fundamentals of rangeland soils and livestock production. Participants were given the skills to identify land types, build their knowledge of native pasture plants, develop strategies to manage land condition, understand how to manage nutritional requirement of livestock and estimate the long and short term stock carrying capacity.

The Grazing Land Management workshops were offered through the *From the Group Up* project, which is delivered by the SA Arid Lands Landscape Board, through funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.



New entertainment included the SA Axe-mans Association, Big Boys Toys and the Jelly Bean Train.


The Bar was once again run by the Cricket Club, The Tennis/Netball clubs provided a three course meal and the Catholic Women's Association provided afternoon tea.

A great deal of hard work goes into organising country shows, so to the small band of volunteers on the committee, thankyou for your hard work and commitment to the 2013 Quorn Show.





PICHI RICHI RAILWAY'S Goods Shed is situated opposite the beautiful historic Quorn Railway Station. It was built in 1879 during the construction of the Port Augusta and Government Gums Railway. The railway was a very busy transport service, not only people, but also for freight. This included commercial items for sale in the stores and hotels, personal belongings, and goods for the local industries, including the railway. Our Goods Shed is the same design as at railway stations throughout South Australia.


Goods Sheds were managed by the Station Master provided unloading and loading facilities where all freight was documented for delivery to other regional centres.



Return Thanks

Ross and I are sad to advise of the passing of our beloved daughter Felicity last month at the Modbury hospice.

She had been diagnosed with Stage 4 Glioblastoma (brain cancer) in May 2017. Over the last six years of Felicity's illness we have had a lot of support from the Quorn community.

The recommended treatment for her in 2017-2018 was not on the PBS at that time. It was only available by patients paying for it. And at a huge cost.

Felicity received many donations from the Quorn community to help defray this enormous cost. The Stock Yard Arena Association, the Catholic Women's Fellowship and the ladies who very generously allowed themselves to be photographed nude on the 2018 Quorn Community Calendar. No mean feat! Plus many individual donations which allowed her to receive this treatment. (Which is now free on the PBS!)

From the time of diagnosis Felicity fought hard to be around as long as possible to see her five children grow up.

She was lucky that an immunotherapy trial which she was enrolled in provided a reprieve of over three years. When that stopped working she pestered her oncologist to trial any possible treatment in SA. And she did!

Four more trials, purely experimental one of which caused serious chemical burns resulting in two weeks hospitalization in the Burns Unit at the RAH.

We are eternally grateful for the continuing support of the Quorn community. So many thanks again
